Use a ball of some recognized dairy breeds and keep the heifers from the very choicest cows and train them up right. Don't fatten them and let them get wild, but keep them growing and handle them genily and continuously. Do not let them calve in the woods or somewhere and then break them in to be milked by a rope round their legs and a club on their back. Kindness paid with the young heifer-keep her milking just as long as possible and in that way give her a habit of long milking. Some men were always looking for a hardy breed of cows. Such cows were no good in the dairy. A man to be a successful dairyman must be a good judge of a cow; he must have a love for nis cows, understand their wants and their comforts and then they will repay him.
