Ottawa, April 10—The midnight casualty list contains the names of four killed in action, three died of wounds, one died of heart failure, thirteen wound-ed, three seriously ill, and seven suffering from shell shock among the Cana-dian infantry; one died of wounds and three wounded and one dangerously ill among the Mounted Rifles. Seven maritime province men are named in the list, six of them former residents of the province of New Brunswick. One St. John man is named G. F. MacNeill, of 283 Germain street, who is reported wounded.

Ottawa, April 11-The casualty list issued at midnight by the militia de-partment shows that a new system has come into being in that department in rting of the casualties in the various Canadian overseas units. The unit h a casualty occurs is not given as heretofore, but the man's number, his name, the hospital to which he has been admitted and the nature of his wounds, if wounded are given. Those 'next of kin' to any casualty will be notified in the usual way, but information to news-papers will follow the new vogue. L.), reported admitted to No. 6 Beitish Red Cross Hospital at Etaples on April 2, suffering from a gun shot wound in the shoulder which the official report characterizes as "severe."

This report shows that in Canada during the month of December, 1915, there were 23,074 recruits secured, in January, 1916, 29,212, in February, 26,659, and in March just closed no less than 32,709, or 3,000 more men than in any of the three preceding months. This is a rather remarkable fact, showing that in spite of the opening up This is a rather remarkable fact, showing that in spite of the opening up of spring and the resultant activities in agricultural and other lines of business the recruiting results have not been affected adversely. Canada by now has reached the 300,000 mark in the number of men she has recruited for overseas service; the total up to March 31 in the official re-port shows 295,680. The first half of the month of March gave 16,608 recruits

in the Dominion, whilst the last lifteen days of the month gave 16,637, show. ing the steady stream that is flocking to the colors and the firm resolution of the Canadian people to see this thing through to a finish.

The district of Quebec is fas down in the list, having given only 542 men during the entire month of March. The maritime provinces make a good showing with nearly 4,000 recruits for the month.




