Dana on Municipal Government.

New York was recently jubilant at being freed from the ring of robbers that oppressed her, and looked confidently forward to honest government and no more increase of debt or taxation. That hope, a hope which was apparently so well founded, has been blasted, and the necessity of reform is as great to-day, judging by the financial status of the corporation, as it was in the time of Tweed and Connolly. The Comptroller and the head of the Board of Works department may not pocket a percentage of the money that passes through their hands, but it disappears in some way with a rapidity suggestive of the old regime. Some exploring journalists will soon discover, doubtless, as the one that the *Times* expressed. There must be something wrong when even an increase on the Tweed rate of taxation does not check the expansion of the city's debt. The kind of Reform Government (that is what they call it) enjoyed by New York is evidently akin to the Reform Government with which the Province of Ontario and the Dominion of Canada are afflicted: taxes are multiplied and levied in a manner, both in the name of economy and purity. The successors of Tweed, like the present rulers of Canada, have "elevated the standard of political morality" in an admirably expeditious manner. The industrial classes of Canada have been declaring in favor of a change of Government by condemning the policy of the Mackenzie-Blank Cabinet, and the industrial classes of New York, being equally eager for change, are doing so in a more direct, Political Party and tendered Mr. Chas. A. Dana, editor of the *Sun*, their nomination for Mayor. Mr. Dana replies as follows:

Gettinizers: I thank you very cordially, and thank your constituents also, for the compliment paid me in your nomination for Mayor of New York.

I appreciate the honor that comes fresh and direct from the people, and not from an organized party, and I am confident that, whatever I might be able to do for you as Mayor, I can serve you as efficiently in my present occupation as an editor.

I agree with you entirely as to the need of a reform in the government of this city, which shall check the progressive increase of taxation. This increase now goes on under every party and every administration. If Tweed and Connolly were more rapid, Green and Heymeyer are none the less slow. To the workingman especially this is a matter of vital concern; for in the end the taxes are paid out of the pockets of the laborer with peculiar hardship upon them in the form of enormous rents, the enhanced cost of living, and the general gloom that hangs over the city so full of gloom. I rejoice, therefore, at every manifestation of public opinion that will uphold the reform of the management of party leaders and to select their own candidates for office, that parties can be kept within the bounds of decorum and be made to pay a due regard to the public welfare in selecting their nominees.

We publish Mr. Dana's letter because it contains truths for St. John. In St. John as in New York the increase of taxation and the growth of the municipal debt go on under every party and every administration. In St. John as in New York "enormous rents," and "the enhanced cost of every necessary of life," are experienced, while "the stagnation of business" and "the stopping of work" are threatened as the result of the high wages thereby rendered necessary.

The Government Prosecuting the Mail!

In order to supply houses and dwelling room for the immense additional population of home, consequent upon the permanent establishment of the Italian seat of Government there, four new quarters are to be added to the city. The first quarter will be beyond the River, to the north and east of the Castle of St. Angelo; the second will cover the occupied portions of the Viminal and Quirinal hills, the greater portion of the Esquiline, and will include the district near the river; and the fourth along the Janiculum, beyond the gardens of the Corsini Palace.

The largest vaulted roof in the world is claimed by Vienna—that belonging to the great exhibition building. It is said to cover nine times the space of the dome of St. Paul's, in London, eight times the area of the dome of St. Peter's, and seven times that of St. Sophia, at Constantinople. This miracle of architectural skill is 370 feet in diameter, and several feet round, and stands on a ring of thirty columns, thirty-six feet apart, all round the circumference. Within this ring of columns there is no support. The upper dome, 100 feet in diameter, is supported by a series of windows 40 feet high and 10 feet wide, between 20 columns which carry the upper dome. The slope of the cone is 30 degrees, and the length of the slope on plates, tapering uniformly upward from the circumference to the top of the cone. They are riveted like the plates of a ship; each row of plates covers one degree of the circle, and each bottom plate is one yard wide between the rivets, and one metre wide over the rivets.
