business papers, and I give it you because it portrays the most pronounced characteristic of her life:

Not forever on thy knees
Would Jehovah have thee found;
There are griefs Jehovah sees,
There are burdens thou might'st ease.
Look around."

She was eminently helpful. She had no patience with those whose religion began and ended in church attendance and pious talk. Hers was a practical application of the Golden Rule.

Her love for the W. C. T. U. was very deep. She often said to me, when urged to rest and lessen her work, "There is nothing I could give up but the W. C. T. U., and would you have me drop out of my life the only bright spot in it?" So she labored on till the silver cord that bound her to the earthward side of that eternal life, that begins with surrender to Jesus, but ends never, had been strained till a feather's weight might snap it.

We have lost our friend and fellow-helper, but her life work remains. None can rob her, or us, of it. It was built upon the rock Christ Jesus, and with the silver, gold and precious stones of faith in God and love for humanity.

Let me close this reference to our comrade by an extract from her will. It reads thus:

Clause 6.—"1 will and bequeath to the President of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union of Ontario, One Hundred dollars, to be applied by such President to the objects and purposes of the Union."

Our sisters in Cornwall have reared for Miss MacArthur a monument that for a hundred years or more may say to thirsty passers-by, "Let your life, too, be rich in self-forgetting sagrifices." Can we not so invest that \$100 that it may scatter seeds of blessing, the harvest of which will be ripening as long as time lasts?

How easy it would be to linger over the precious memories our friend has left us, but her own energetic, almost brusque, exhortion would be, "Don't waste time grieving, but get to work." And as we can never dissever from Jennie the thought of intense activity, we will turn from our contemplation of this brave, wholesome spirit, now entered into tireless and endless ministries, to a nutshell-record of this year's work.
