Anglican Churches Have Had Much Prosperity

Annual Vestry Meetings Held Last Night in Three Churches—Splendid Work at St. John's

At St. Jude's.
There was a good attendance of members at the annual vestry meeting of St. Jude's Church, which was held last night. The assistant rector, Rev. H. A. Wright, presided. The financial year of the parish does not end until 31st of March, so that the churchwardens were unable to make a report of the financial condition, but they hope to present a satisfactory statement at the adjourned meeting. The financial statements of the organizations of the church will be presented at the adjourned meeting. The duplex envelope was considered at length, and a committee was appointed to consider the best way to introduce it should the vestry adopt it. A committee was also appointed to look into the heating system of the church and parish hall.

The rector reported that Trinity Mission would be set apart as an independent, self-sustaining parish on the 1st of June. St. Luke's Mission was also making satisfactory progress and energetic work was being done there. At St. Jude's it was gratifying to know that the number of communicants on Easter Sunday was the largest in the history of the parish.

The following officers were appointed for the coming year: Churchwardens, S. Smith and Dr. Lundy; Blott, J. B. Lundy, L.D.S., W. Foster, J. Broadbent, W. Moss, D. H. Spence.

Mission's committee and auditors were also appointed.

Votes of thanks for assistance given during the year were passed to the choir, the Ladies' Guild, A.Y.P.A., Sunday School and other organizations.

Much regret was expressed that the rector, Rev. Rural Dean Wright, was unable to be present at the meeting, and by a standing vote the vestry expressed its sympathy for him and his family. The meeting was gratified to know that he was making such a good recovery, and hoped he would soon be among them again.

The vestry adjourned for two weeks. At the congregational meeting which followed the vestry, the following were elected lay representatives to the Synod: W. N. Andrews and W. E. Foster; substitutes, W. Scace and C. House.

At St. James.
Notable progress during the year was made at St. James' church, the annual vestry meeting of which was held last night and was largely attended. Rev. Hubbard Miller presided, and the meeting proved most harmonious and was an excellent

augury of successful work during the ensuing year. The financial account was of a favorable nature, splendid improvement having been shown in the Sunday school and the Ladies' Air societies. The Wardens chosen were: For the rector, Alfred Vince; People's Warden, C. Simmonds; Lay Representative, A. T. Pickles; Substitute, A. T. Pickles; Select Vestry, J. Braby, W. Shackie, A. T. Pickles, W. Roberts.

It was decided to instal this year a furnace in the church, and also to carry out considerable repairing, rendered necessary as a result of the recent storm.

At St. John's.
St. John's annual Vestry meeting was held last evening and the Rector presided. The financial statement presented by the Wardens was most satisfactory. Reports from the various organizations showed that they were in a flourishing condition. Easter services had been of a most inspiring nature. The Lenten offering on that day was \$416.00 and church books showed a balance of \$350.00 on hand. Mr. F. E. Morrison was re-elected delegate to the Synod, which Mr. G. Collington as substitute. Mr. Suddaby, who has been Rector's warden since the organization of St. John's parish, was again appointed warden by the Rector and Mr. Tremblay. The Rector and Mr. Tremblay were also re-elected Peoples' warden. The Rector, in addressing the Vestry, reported over 800 visits, besides the hospital, and visits to institutions; 19 baptisms, 6 weddings and 12 funerals. "One thing we face now" said he, "and that is lack of accommodation. We need a larger Sunday School. We are crowded so that there is not room enough. We must enlarge and must do so soon or we cannot do our work properly. We cannot do our church to meet the growing needs. It is true we are hindered just now by a debt, on our organ and the lot next the church, but we have a balance now—not a deficit—to apply to that. I appeal to you to do all you can for now is the time to act, not in years to come. An effort will be made to wipe out the organ debt, also the debt on the lot in May. Votes of thanks were extended to all the various organizations for their untiring zeal and energy in St. John's Church, also to individual members, who had undertaken definite work and had carried it out in their quiet way. There have been many improvements in the church during the past year. Miss Dalton presented a new altar curtain, also new altar hangings of red plush. St. John's is making steady progress under their present Rector, the Rev. C. W. Saunders.

is horrible and it has presented a most complex situation. The loss of life and damage to property is the greatest conceivable blow, not only to Omaha, but to the entire state of Nebraska. I will call upon the State of Nebraska to request every assistance and I am sure the state will respond.

All Records Broken.
CHICAGO, March 25.—The enormous damage caused by tornadoes in Nebraska, Iowa and Indiana brought out the statement from insurance companies that losses thus far this year on tornadoic insurance breaks all records. While fire losses are smaller than usual, Tornadoes do not usually come so early in the year. Insurance agents say that the storms in the south last week were unusually destructive and that the Nebraska storm will up the losses. Figures on the policies affected by the Omaha storm are not yet available, but it is said that many buildings destroyed were protected by tornado insurance. One eastern company collected \$124,012 in premiums on such policies in Nebraska alone in 1912.
