## Editorial Brevities.

The Nova Scotia House of Assembly has adopted the Daylight Saving time.

The British Columbia Legislature has decided to adopt the daylight saving time no matter whether the rest of Canada does or not.

The Second Canadian Division is now arriving in England. The 25th N. S. Batt. is in this division and is expected to be home the middle of next month.

A London cable to the Toronto Star states that the Olympic is expected to sail from Southampton on April 12th with 5000 troops of the 1st Canadian Division.

The three principal positions in the house of commons are now occupied by Nova Scotians, namely: Sir Robert Borden, prime minister, Daniel D. McKenzie, opposition leader, and Hon. Mr. N. Rodde, speaker.

The evacuation of the Canadian troops in Siberia is expected to begin about April 20th, when the steamer Montevideo sails for Canada with seventy officers and seven hundred men, including about three hundred sick.

The Militia Department has been advised that the steamer, Lepland, with 1,974 Canadian troops on board, sailed from England on the 10th, and will probably reach Halifax on April 15th. She carries 103 officers and 1,872 other ranks.

The air-plane of the Short Brothers, one of the entries for the £10,000 race across the Atlantic, will start from Ireland for Newfoundland on April 16, weather permitting. The air-plane is expected to make the journey in twenty hours.

The formerly well known steamer, Boston, which plied between Yarmouth and Boston, has been broken up in dock in the United States. Her engines, boilers and other machinery were in excellent condition and will be installed in some other hull.

General Newburn stated in the House of Commons Monday that on Canadian soldier had lost his four limbs, sixty-eight had lost the sight of both eyes, and seventy-four for the remainder of their lives would be compelled to remain in bed. Most cases of this type, he said, were the result of gunshot wounds of the spine with resulting paralysis.

Inbound at St. John's Nfld., for three weeks, the ship, Cape Breton, sailed on April 6th for Sydney, but her boiler beginning to leak, she started to return to port. Four miles off the entrance the patch on her boiler blew off, causing the death of the first and second engineer, and two Chinese stokers. A fifth man died of tetanus which reached port. The third engineer was badly scalded but will recover.

Frank Woolworth, who started a five and ten cent store at Utica, N.Y., forty years ago, on a capital of \$50, and eventually became the millionaire proprietor of a great chain of these stores in the United States, Canada and England, died suddenly at his home at Glen Cove, Long Island. In addition to establishing a business with profits said to be nearly \$5,000,000 yearly, Mr. Woolworth built the celebrated fifty-one story Woolworth building in lower New York, said to be the tallest building in the world.

The Canadian Pacific Railway has invaded Digby and taken over the Pines, for many years a leading summer hotel there. To say that the citizens of Digby generally are delighted is putting it mildly. In the past few days the Pines did a big business, but the slump in tourist travel caused by the abnormal conditions of the past four years put a crimp in it. But now that it has been added to the C. P. R. chain of hotels, and is to be brought up to C. P. R. standard, there is a feeling that Digby will again take her place as the leading summer resort of Eastern Canada.

Readers of THE ACADIAN of some years ago will remember an interesting correspondent who frequently contributed articles to our columns under the name of 'Leve'. There are others who will note a number of letters from the same writer of late. THE ACADIAN is glad to welcome 'Leve' back to our columns after a long silence. His reminiscences of college days in Nova Scotia in this issue will be found very interesting. 'Leve' has for many years been a resident of California, but we understand, anticipates visiting his native county of Kings during the coming summer.

To induce the public to do more buying the Director-General of the United States Department of Labor has sent a circular letter broadcast throughout the United States with the object of persuading merchants that more advertising must be done. In the circular he says, 'The public has more money now than it has ever had before, but is hesitant about spending it. Such a state of mind can be overcome surely and quickly only by advertising. The Department of Labor believes that in inducing this movement for more advertising it can shorten the period of readjustment of business and industry from war to peace.'

## Accident on the D. A. R.

A bad accident occurred on the D. A. R. last Saturday morning when the express from Halifax left the rails about half a mile east of Hantsport. All the cars except the parlor car left the rails. None of the passengers were injured but two of the train hands, Messrs. Coal Pentz and Harry Taylor, were injured. The former suffered a broken leg and the latter was injured internally. Engineer Moxon and Fireman Stockall stuck to their posts and it was fortunate for them that they did, for had they jumped they would doubtless have been seriously or fatally injured.

The roadbed was torn up for a considerable distance, but wrecking crews were soon on hand and, by constantly sticking at their task, had completed a line past the wreck about noon on Sunday. In the meantime provision was made for the transfer of passengers to trains running in both directions. The 'Northland' did not sail from Yarmouth until the arrival of Saturday night of the special which departed from the scene of the wreck about noon. The cause of the disaster has not been stated by the authorities.

## Almost a Drowning.

The little two-year old child of Mr. Anselme Boyd, of Grand Pre, had a very narrow escape from drowning yesterday morning. The child was playing near the well and in some way fell in. It was in the water about two minutes before it was rescued. Some of the neighboring women worked hard over the child and a call was sent to Dr. Elliot who was in Port Williams at the time. He hurried to the scene and succeeded in saving the child's life. If it had not been for the good work done by the neighbors and the hurried arrival of Dr. Elliot, the accident would probably have been fatal.

## The Tax Rate.

At a meeting of the Council last week the estimates for the ensuing year were presented and the rate of taxation fixed at \$2.75 on the hundred dollars. This is an advance over last year, due in large measure to the increased expense of conducting the schools, in view of proposed changes and improvements. At the present basis of assessment the tax is not a large one, and citizens generally will be pleased to know that no greater increase in the rate was found necessary.

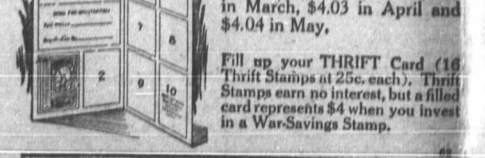


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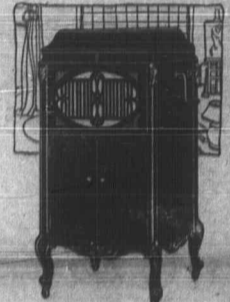
