

When the Liberal administration of 1921 was formed, Mr. Graham became a member of the Cabinet. Both in Council and in Parliament his co-operation was unfailing in all the affairs of the Government.

Of the ministers of the Crown, who were, or had been ministers of Sir Wilfrid Laurier's Cabinet, at the time I was appointed as Minister of Labour in 1909, Sir William Mulock and Sir Allen Aylesworth now alone remain. Of the ministers who were members of Sir Wilfrid Laurier's Cabinet, Mr. Graham and I alone remained of those who subsequently became members of the Liberal administration formed in 1921. The severance of this personal link with the past <sup>occasioned by Mr. Graham's death</sup> is something which, naturally, I feel very keenly. The association, however, and all that it represented in a lifelong political friendship will ever remain among the most valued possessions and cherished rewards of my public life.

With the sense of loss occasioned in his passing, there will be felt on all sides the deepest sympathy for Mrs. Graham who, for over sixty years, was the devoted companion of his home and the inseparable and constant helpmate of his public life.
