ARANDON ALL POSITIONS.

A despatch from Tokio says: The battle of Liao-Yang on Wednesday might continued until midnight, with frightful slaughter. The Japanese at last succeeded in getting a column across the Tuitse River, northeast of Liao-Yang, and then Gen. Kouropatkin gave the order to fall back on the main works, but owing to the Japanese pressure this movement was not executed. The armies slept in their positions.

At daybreak Thursday the Japanese army on the left delivered a flerce and successful assault against the heights to the west of Hsinling tun and the high ground to the west of Shushanpao. It pierced the Russian lines, and later forced the retrement of the Russian troops from their position on the right and centre.

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## Imperial Limited Train Wrecked West of Winnipeg

A WINNIPED DESPATCH SAYS: A TERRIBLE ACCIDENT TOOK PLACE TO THE IMPERIAL LIMITED ON THE CANADIAN PACIFIC RAILWAY AT SINTALUTA, ONE STATION EAST OF IN-DIAN HEAD, ON THURSDAY NIGHT. THE EXPRESS RAN INTO AN OPEN SWITCH AND CRASHED INTO A FREIGHT TRAIN WHICH WAS STANDING THERE. FIVE WERE KILLED AND FIVE WERE INJURED. THEY WERE ALL WOMEN AND WERE TRAVEL-LING IN THE TOURIST CAR.
