

Grand Trunk Headed For Championship

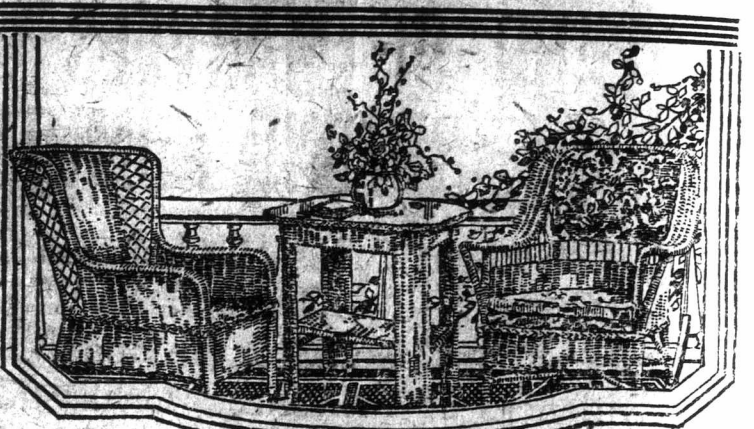
