### MOTOR BUS BURNED

Last night the motor bus belonging to Mr. Ross Cunningham, liveryman, Trenton, was burned while near Bayside on the Provincial highway. The driver was coming toward Belleville when, owing to the short circuit, the oil became ignited and the forward part of the car was almost instantly in a blaze. There were no passengers in the vehicle at the time and the motorman was powerless to check the progress of the flames. In a very few minutes every inflammable part was reduced to ashes. The loss will be \$3,500 and it is believed there was no insurance. Misfortunes seem to follow this driver. It is only about a year ago that a car belonging to Mr. Cunningham, that he was driving out of Belleville, was totally wrecked, when it skidded off the road and collided with a tree at the Devil's Elbow just west of the city. The bus that was burned last night was the only one that Mr. Cunningham had in his livery.
