CONVOCATION AT MT. ALLISON.

The closing exercises of Mt. Allison University commences on May 9th and the meetings will be of special interest. The class of 1868 will celebrate its 50th Anniversary and the history of the class is worthy of mention. All its members are alive and are well known men. There were four:— Judge Russell of Halifax, Rev. R. W. Weddall, of Shediac, a former pastor at Horton, Rev. Joseph Sellar a former pastor at Canning and Rev. Dr. W. G. Temple of the United States.

One of the features of the University Convocation of this year, will be the presentation by the Graduating Class of a Maple Leaf service flag in memory of the members of the class who are serving at the front. The Class on its entrance in 1914 had forty three male members of these 31 enlisted in the service of King and Country. A few completed their course in engineering and Theology; only two have remained to graduate in Arts or Science with their Class. The Flag will be decorated with thirty-one Maple Leaves to represent the ones who have enlisted. Above four of these leaves will be, also, a White Cross to show that four members of the Class have paid the supreme penalty.

CIVIC ELECTION IN HALIFAX, N. S.

Dr. A. C. Hawkins Led the Poll in Three-cornered Mayoralty Contest.

Halifax, N. S., April 25.—Dr. A. C. Hawkins, was Wednesday elected Mayor of Halifax by a majority of 852 over Dr. N. E. MacKay and with 858 more votes than those for James A. Halliday who fotted the pool. The total vote was 2,769, only 149 more than one-third for the whole number on the list, which is 7,662. The results of the plebiscite on the Halifax Power Company question is that the city is authorized to advance \$400,000 to the company in exchange for a mortgage of \$400,000 and fifty-one per cent of the stock of the company and the company undertaking to light the city for \$30,000 a year for twenty-five years.
