
The Delegates at Montreal MONTREAL, July 16.-The inter-coloni



Trouble Over the Soc Canal. SAULT STE. MARTE, Mich., July 16.— Considerable excitement exists in both of the Soc's because of the orib work at the head of the new Canadian ship canal proving inefficient, necessitating the tear-ing out and rebuilding of 260 feet of it. The trouble arcos from the pressure of time heavy material at the back of the orib and can only be removed by rebuilding, which-is now in progress. 
