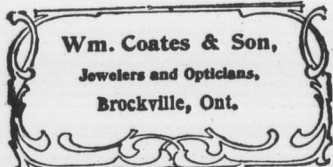

The Honey Crop Committee of the Ontario Beekeepers' Association, which met in Toronto last week, considered that the season's crop of honey will not be over 20 or 25 per cent of last year's crop. In view of this, our chief apiarist, Mr. M. B. Holmes, has good reason to be satisfied with the harvest gathered by his thousands of busy workers. His bees came through last winter in good shape, but during the early part of the season found comparatively little honey. During the last few weeks they have been making good, and he is now assured of better than 50 per cent of an average yield. The shortage combined with the failure of small fruits, will increase the price of honey, but even at the advanced price, all things considered, it is about the cheapest table delicacy procurable. Mr. Holmes has commenced shipping to the wholesale trade and has also a considerable local demand to satisfy.
