Doctors Saved Her Life and the Young Couple Were Then Married.

New York, Nov. 14.—Miss Adele Cram, of Crownfield, Mass., who tried to commit suicide in this city some time ago, because of Crownfield, Mass., who tried to commit suicide in this city some time ago, because she believe her lover to be dead, left Bellevue Hospital yesterday, and was married to Bonford Boniface, for love of whom she tried to end her life. Miss Cram came here from Springfield in the middle of October to find work. When she returned home later she told her aunt, with whom she lived, that she had met a handsome young man in Ceatral Park. who wanted to marry her, and he is a young lawyer named Bennett, and very handsome, she said. Soon after she heard that Bennett was to undergo an operation, and then she received a letter, purporting to come from his friend, saying he was dead. She came to New York, and tried to find Bennett's home to attend the funeral. She could find no trace, whatever of him, and on Oct. 31 she was found overcome by gas in a room of the Grand Union Hotel, where she had registered under her own pame the night before. She was taken to Bellevue Hospital, where the doctors, by hard work, helped her back to good health. While she was in the hospital it came out the the rear week had given the name of While she was in the hospital it came out that the man who had given the name of Bennett was Bonford Boniface, and that he had sent her notice of his death to avoid a marriage that was objectionable to his mother. He went to Bellevue and express mother. He went to Bellevue and express his willingness to marry Miss Cram, and yesterday's wedding was the result. Be-fore the ceremony the girl was taken prison-er to the police court, where she was ar-raigned on a charge of attempting suicide. The charge was not pressed.

London, Nov. 14.—Lord Roberts, in response to in inquiry from the Prince of Wales, has telegraphed, authorizing a denial of the charges of cowardice made in Lord Rosslyn's book against British officers in the Sannas Post affair. Lord Rosslyn, in view of Lord Roberts' denial, has written to the Prince of Wales, regretting that he was misinformed and tendering an apology in the following language:—"I owe to the regiments whose honor my publication of a groundless report has called in question, the deepest apology and the fullest reparation. I offer it to you, sir, as colonelemented; I offer it to the colonels of the various regiments. I offer it to every officer, non-commissioned officer and man, and I sincerely trust that this unqualified apology will be accepted in the spirit in which it is offered."

### JUST TO ANNOY THE

The Boers Keep Up Their Attack On the British

London, Nov. 14.-Under date of Johan nesburg, Nov. 12, Lord Roberts telegraphs to the War Office as follows :-

"Rundle reports skirmishes with small parties of Boers in the Harrismith, Reitz and Vrede districts recently. The commandoes appear to be acting independently, and with no object, except to give as much annoyance as possible to the British. Our casualties in these skirmishes were two

casualties in these skirmishes were two killed and seven wounded.
"Douglas arrived at Ventersdorp Nov. 11 from Zeirust, capturing during the march tweny-one prisoners and a quantity of cattle and sheep. Ventersderp, which has been a depot of supplies for the Boers, will now be cleared out."

Lord Roberts also telegraphs the War Lord Roberts also telegraphs the War Office that General Smith-Dorrien reports that some Canadian wounded who fell into the hands of the Boers were subsequently returned in British ambulances to Belfast

They speak highly of the kind treatment they received from the hands of the Boers. The German Government has officially notified the Colonial Council that it will gladly grant permission to 1,000 Transvaal Boers to trek through the Kalarari desert to territors in German South from tory in German South-west Africa. Arrangements therefor are now be-ing made to welcome the vanquished

Boers as a new and valuable element for the colony.
