

"In my opinion, this is a poor excuse as every body knows that the carp bury themselves in the mud and lie dormant all winter. But I'll tell you what fish would be caught—the bass, of course, The black bass spend the winter in the deep water of the bays, in a semi-hibernate condition. It would be an easy matter for the net fishers to put these fish back, but the question is can we rely on their doing fishers to put these fish back, but the question is, can we rely on their doing so. "This is a matter for all owners of property at the Eau to look into. The value of their property will depend to a great extent on the excellence of the fishing and Ericau real estate will fluctuate in value with the success for failure of each season's catch. It is note of warning, and all the Maple City fishermen should see to it that the petition asking permission to use nets in the Eau is never granted."

### HINDERING WORK OF THE CHURCH

Refusal of Clergymen to Obey Admoni-

tion of His Bishop Constitutes a Serious Offence.

London, Monday, Jan. 21.-An important encyclical signed by the Archbishop of Canterbury, Primate of all kngland, the Archbishop of York, and thirty-one bishops. has been issued to the clergy of the Established Church regarding the dissensions over the ritual question. The encyclical constitutes a grave expostulation with that section of the clergy who persist in abusing the freedom of the Church. It declares that the refusal of a clergyman to obey the solemn admonition of his bishop is a grave offence, and is still graver when he sets aside the judgment of the bishops as a body. It appeals to the clergy to submit themselves to these judgments, and say that those who refuse to do so are practically setting up a form of government which is distinctly unepiscopal and are hindering the work of the Church Archbishop of York, and thirty-one bishops.


