REPEAL OF CONMEE ACT

Ontario Municipal Association Will Petition That Way.

Vote on Expropriation or Purchase on Equitable Terms of Any Light or Water Plant Was Unanimous to a Man—No Change to Be Asked in County Councils' Act—Officers and Executive Elected.

Toronto, Sept. 1.—"Let good enough alone" was the keynote of the afternoon meeting of the Ontario Municipal Association, as voiced in a resolution passed, by which the Legislature will be asked to make no change in the County Councils' Act as it stands at present.

Prior to their adjournment the association passed a resolution lamenting the death of the late City Solicitor T. P. Caswell.

Knocks Conmee Act. At the morning session the association dealt with the Conmee Act, and to a member were opposed to it. The following resolution was passed: "That the Conmee Act be repealed, and that the municipalities be given the power to purchase or expropriate on equitable terms any light or water plant."

Mayor Urquhart and Ald. Jones were heard and gave voice to their views on the subject. City Solicitor McIntyre of Kingston wished to supplement words in the resolution by which protection would be given to private capital in event of the act being repealed. To this Controller Hubbard strongly objected, and Mr. McIntyre's proposal was lost.

A resolution of thanks was tendered the Imperial Government for the interest taken in the question of water prices for the development and transmission of electric energy. The time-worn resolution, asking that the local Government defray the costs of the owners' bills was again passed. The matter of the term of two years' representation by mayors and aldermen met with unanimous approval.

Their Officers Elected. Controller Hubbard and Mayor Ellis of Ottawa were proposed for the presidency. On an open vote, Controller Hubbard was elected. Mayor Ellis was then elected to the vice-presidency; second vice-president, D. McIntyre; third vice-president, Ald. Cooper, London; fourth vice-president, Warden Beam, Welland; secretary-treasurer, S. H. Kent, Hamilton.

The executive this year will give fair representation to every part of the Province, including the County Councils. The following are elected, the Mayor of Toronto, Mayor of London, Mayor of Brockville, Mayor of Ingersoll, Mayor of Cornwall, Mayor of Parkhill, F. MacKee, K. C. of Hamilton, City Solicitor Chisholm of Toronto, W. C. McKie, Belleville; W. A. Boys of Barrie, Charles Collins, Wentworth County; S. R. Armstrong, clerk of Peterboro.

RESULTS INDIFFERENT.

Observation of Sun's Eclipse Marred By Cloudy Weather.

London, Sept. 1.—A telegram from Sir Norman Lockyer, director of the Solar Physics Observatory, South Kensington, London, chief of the eclipse party at Palma, Island of Majorca, says: "The results were indifferent owing to unfavorable weather."

Prof. Hugh Callender of the Royal College of Science, London, reports from Castillon de la Plaine, near Valencia, Spain, that the first and last contacts were observed in a clear sky and that good records of the radiation and temperature were obtained.

JAPAN HAS CONSENTED

An Immediate Armistice is to Be Concluded.

Proclamation For the Suspension of Hostilities to Be Signed To-day—Announcement Was Conveyed to Russian Plenipotentiary by Mr. Takahira Late Thursday Night—Rapid Progress Made in Drafting Treaty.

Portsmouth, N. H., Sept. 1.—Japan, through Baron Komura, has agreed to the immediate conclusion of an armistice. At 11 o'clock last night Mr. Takahira went to Baron de Rosen's room and explained that he and Baron Komura had received instructions to arrange terms of an armistice. Baron de Rosen immediately communicated with M. Witte, and it is probable that a meeting will be held this morning for the proclamation of a complete suspension of hostilities preliminary to the arrangements of the details by the two plenipotentiaries upon the battlefield.

Rapid progress was made yesterday in the drafting of the treaty of peace. Baron Komura, at M. Witte's request, will probably to-day fix a day for its signature.

Russia's consent to a suspension of hostilities reached M. Witte last night in a cablegram from Count Lamsdorff, whom Emperor Nicholas has empowered to deal with this important phase of the negotiations.

So rapidly and well is Mr. de Martens, with Mr. Dennison, performing his delicate and important task of drafting the treaty, that he was able to return from the Navy Yard last night to report to M. Witte the practical completion of ten articles. It is expected the treaty in its entirety will consist of 15 articles, exclusive of the preamble.

Japan's original demands are said to have numbered 13. Only 12, however, were presented to the Russians, as President Roosevelt is credited with persuading the Japanese plenipotentiaries, before the convening of the conference to withdraw one of the conditions which he regarded as unjust.

M. Witte is anxious to sail for home on September 12. In the meantime, he wishes to take leave of President Roosevelt and personally present the thanks of his Emperor for the President's assistance.

The only difficulties which have thus far appeared, have been due to the ambiguous language of certain parts of the daily protocols which form the framework of the treaty.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 1.—The Novoe Vremya says: Russia's constitution will be reconstructed on a basis of creation of new Ministerial Council, M. Witte becoming Premier. It is reported that the Emperor will confer upon Witte the title of Count.

Women Folks Are Glad. Elizabethgrad, Russia, Sept. 1.—There is a general feeling of joy here over the peace news. The wives and other relatives of soldiers at the front embrace and kiss each other on the streets.

Stormbound Boats Free. Port Dalhousie, Sept. 1.—All of the stormbound boats that were sheltered here left yesterday for their destination. The elevator opened up yesterday, this being the first business done for the last three months. The Montreal transportation boats, steamer Westmount and barge Mindeosa, were taking in their lighters last night.

Street Railwaymen Convene. St. John, N. B., Sept. 1.—The Canadian Street Railway Association is in quarterly session here. The matters discussed relate to operating street railways in general.

FACTOR IN WORLD PEACE.

New Anglo-Japanese Treaty Which Has Just Been Signed.

London, Sept. 1.—The report that an Anglo-Japanese treaty was signed Aug. 12, by Foreign Secretary Lansdowne and Minister Hayaashi, is confirmed.

While secrecy is maintained for the present regarding the exact terms, it may be said that the document is of far-reaching importance. It affords mutual guarantees for the protection of British and Japanese interests, even if the two contracting powers are only threatened by a single hostile power, and assures the maintenance of the status quo in the far east.

The new treaty will be found to be a powerful factor in ensuring the peace of the world, at any rate so far as the far east is concerned.

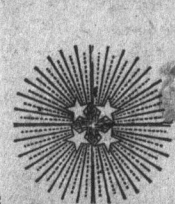
