An Immediate Armistice is to

Be Concluded.

Proclamation For the Suspension of Hostilities to Be Signed To-day-Announcement Was Conveyed to Russian Plenipotentiary by Mr. Takahira Late Thursday Night-Rapid Progress Made In Drafting Treaty.

Portsmouth, N. H., Sept. 1.—Japan, through Baron Komura, has agreed to the immediate conclusion of an armistice. At 11 o'clock last night Mr. Takahira went to Baron de Rosen's room and explained that he and Baron Komura had seceived instructions to arrange terms of an armistice. Baron de Rosen immediately communicated with M. Witte, and it is probable that a meeting will be held this morning for the proclemation of a complete suppension of hostilities preliminary to the arrangements of the details by the two generals upon the battlefield.

Russia's consent to a suspension of hostilities reached M. Witte last night in a cablegram from Count Lamsdorff, whom Emperor Nicholas has empowered to deal with this important phase of the negotiations.

London, Sept. 1.—The report that an anglo-Japanese treaty was signed Aug. 12, by Foreign Secretary Lansdowne and Minister Hayashi, is confirmed
