LUBRICATION.

If every man who "toggles year in and year out to make both ends meet in his business without advertising would take a day off to investigate the value of publicity he would return to his office next morning converted. Such a man would not need to carry his researches beyond the limits of his own family. Let him ascertain how his wife came to purchase the articles where. Let him inquire whether the foods that appear on his table are or are not advertised. Let him consider whether there is any connection between his own expenditures and publicity. Let him observe whether the members of his family and his neighbors in reading their papers look over the store news, as well as the local and telegraphic news. And then let him join the great army of money-makers who advertise regularly in the newspapers, and abandon the effort to run a complicated piece of business mechanism without the aid of lubrication.

GOOD MELODRAMA PLOT.

The hitherto unrecorded incident of the Crown going into safe-breaking is what is reported from the provincial capital. Crown Attorney Curry, by proxy, broke into two vaults in the office of Jenkins and Hardy, and, as a protection to the Crown, six detectives stood at hand while the job was put through. Truth really is stranger than fiction, and no doubt some enterprising writer of plays will use the incident as the basis of a play. The discovery of evidence of a plumbers' combine, the details of which are being vigorously unearthed, would make the basis of the first act, and the third act would tell what the courts did in the matter. The second and important act would give a good representation of the action in the office upon which the law swooped down. The imaginative mind can easily understand that the play would make a big hit on account of the "thrilling situation of the opening of the vaults."

However, whether or not the importance of the action of Crown Attorney Curry has been overstated from the viewpoint of theatrical managers there can be no doubt that the decisive, quick action of the Crown is appreciated by a great majority of the people. No better evidence of the determination to bring the combines to time could be given than the handling to date of the case against the plumbers. The law is losing its reputation for being slow, and it would seem that it is also forgetting to be a respecter of persons. No surprise is caused when detectives search a man's house for evidence of theft, and the surprise which the search of the office so suddenly entered has caused is proof that the law has not pursued the big fish as relentlessly as the small.

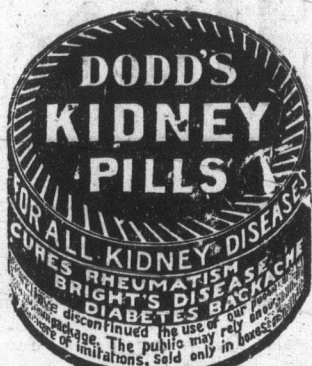

JAMES HARDY CHARGED

Conspiracy Alleged Against Promoter of Combines.

First Technical Charge Is That He Conspired With Others to Restrain and Injure Trade in Enamel Ware—Various Firms May Sue Plumbers For Money Out of Which They Have Been Defrauded.

Toronto, Nov. 22.—Crown Attorney Curry continued his search in the alleged combine offices all day yesterday. A large cartload of books was taken from the office and placed in No. 1 Police Station, where they will be kept until he finishes his search and brings the matter before the magistrate. He will continue taking away such documents as he requires to help out his case. "There is six weeks' work ahead of me," said the Crown Attorney.

Another Information.

In the Police Court yesterday a new information was sworn to by Detective Black. It is against James Hardy "and other persons whose names are at present unknown," and states "that they did, contrary to law, conspire, agree and arrange, the one with the other or others of them, to restrain and injure trade in enamel ware, and to unduly prevent and lessen competition in the production, manufacture, purchase, barter, sale and supply of said enamel ware and other such goods, contrary to the statute."

The proceedings in the Police Court were extremely short. D. R. Thomson, K. C., appeared for Mr. Hardy, but did not talk. In fact, no one spoke on behalf of the combines. Crown Attorney Curry, when the case was called and the new information laid yesterday was read, announced that he wanted a week for a remand.

"There is no election in this case, is there?" asked Magistrate Denison. "None without pleading," answered Mr. Curry, and the magistrate remanded the case until next Tuesday. Mr. Hardy, who had been standing at the back of the court during the earlier proceedings, pushed to the front and was informed of the remand, after which he left the court in company with his lawyer.

Plumbers' Case Goes Over.

The plumbers' conspiracy case was enlarged by Magistrate Denison in the Police Court for a week. Mr. Curry said that he thought it likely that he would be ready to go on then. One feature of the day was the announcement that different firms intend to sue the master plumbers for the money out of which they have been defrauded. Warwick Bros. & Rutter, one of the firms forced to build in a hurry after the big fire, may sue the firm installing their plumbing and stealing from it for \$1500. Among the other firms "soaked" on their plumbing contracts were: W. R. Brock, A. Ansley, Cockburn & Rae, Gordon, Mackay & Co., R. G. Dunn, Alcock, Lyle & Westwood, Brown Bros. and A. Brax & Sons. The W. R. Brock plumbing cost in the neighborhood of \$15,000.

Homeward Sanitarium Sues.

The first municipality to take action is Galt. The Galt Sanitarium Association has received instructions to proceed against the Master Plumbers to recover \$300 alleged overcharge by the Toronto association. The Montreal Master Plumbers Association has issued a positive denial that any attempts have been made by their association to prevent honest competition. In Hamilton the association quit business two weeks ago.

"We did not do things as they were done in Toronto," says one member. "It seems to have been a case of graft there. But when question came as to the legality of our operations we quietly went out of business."

TREATED AS DESERTERS.

British Sailors Wept as the Squadron Sailed Without Them.

New York, Nov. 21.—About 200 sailors from the British squadron, commanded by Prince Louis of Battenberg, were missing from their ships when the squadron made ready to sail yesterday. Several of those who had overstayed their leave were turned away when they tried to board their ships.

As it was within a few hours of the fleet's sailing time when they made their belated appearance, the officers treated them as deserters. The officers said that they had seen these men, on the principle that they are worthless and their loss a good ridance. Many of the rejected sailors cried.

Commissioner Watchorn said that a fine of \$2 a head would be levied on the prince's fleet for every sailor who appeared to have been left stranded in New York, the same as imposed on captains of transatlantic steamers for every immigrant smuggled into the United States without due examination.

The British ships weighed anchor shortly before noon and proceeded down the Hudson River, bound for Gibraltar. Before sailing, Prince Louis paid an official farewell visit to Admiral Evans on board the battleship Maine. As the prince and his party left the Maine to go on board the flagship Drake the American sailors cheered him.

As the squadron passed Governor's Island, the headquarters of the army of the east, a salute was fired from the island, and each cruiser as it passed replied with an equal number of its guns.

The squadron passed out by Sandy Hook before 1 p. m. In passing, the Drake signalled: "Farewell; hope to return."

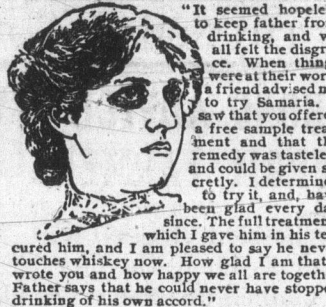
