An 'Old Arm Chair.'

The old arm chair used by the late Sir John A. Macdonald during the years 1874 to 1878, when he was out of office and practising law in Toronto, has recently become the property of R. L. Borden under romantic circumstances. When the personal effects of the late Sir John Macdonald were sold at public auction, the old chair used by Sir John as a senior partner passed into the possession of the new senior member of the firm, the late William Lount, K. C. In 1907 when Mr. Lount was called to the bench, the chair was handed over to the junior member, George A. Kingston, the only Conservative member of the firm. Some years later, Mr. Kingston, as secretary of the Borden Club of Toronto, attended a banquet given by the club in honor of the leader of the Conservative party. He asked Mr. Borden when he should be premier of Canada, to accept the present of the chair. Mr. Borden gave a ready assent and the chair has now been sent to Ottawa.
