It says from 1915 to 1918, as a result of under-nourishment, 763,000 persons died in Germany and a further 150,000 died from a disease, owing to the loss of their power of resistance.

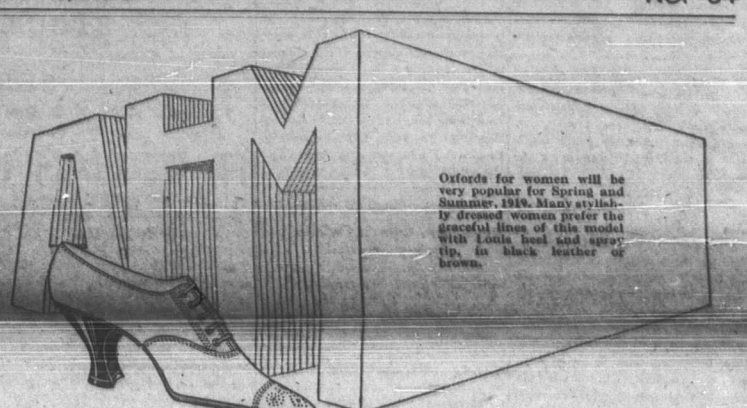
The Graves of Our Fallen Soldiers. Of no small interest to the families of those who have made the supreme sacrifice for the protection of liberty and justice, and not only to those whose loved ones lie in Flanders Fields, where poppies blow, but to all Canadians, comes the report of the Imperial War Graves Commission. The commission assists the governments of the belligerent nations in the burial of their fallen soldiers and sailors in the graves of their own countries.

Miles of Matches. In the 'good days' when 'the world' was three-quarters as happy as it is now, the practice of smoking was in some districts as general as that of eating. It would be difficult to say how many cigarettes were smoked in the course of a year in almost incomputable numbers. A total of some 4,400,000,000 were supplied to the Army alone, and these, if placed end to end, would encircle the globe eight times. The total weight would be close on 500,000 tons, and their value, at retail prices, would be roughly, \$16,000,000.

General Von Hindenburg. In announcing his desire to retire, von Hindenburg, while he deemed it his duty to serve Germany during a difficult transitional period, speaks of how hard it has become for him, in view of his opinions and my entire personality and the past, to continue to exercise my office. Not a few of us have said harsh things of Von Hindenburg. His heavy countenance, his bull neck even the provocative way he wears his hair, has not stimulated affection. He is seemed almost a wooden man, and as ugly as the tin figure of him in Berlin. Into whose hands the patriotic Germans drove nails at a cost of a mark each. He has been a blood-and-iron man of the Bismarck type, minus the mental gifts that made the weakness of Bismarck interesting.

Field Crops Competitions. The N. S. Field Crops Competitions Prize Lists as now on the press. Those who desire copies should write to Mr. P. P. Turner, N. S. A. New departure included this year, is that in addition to the prizes for seed wheat and oats, a series of prizes is being offered for seed clover. Production of this commodity should be stimulated by present high prices. There is also a special prize list for competition in trap growing, for which the Halifax Board of Trade has generously donated the sum of \$200. It should be especially noted that in order to qualify for entry in the Field Crops Competitions for 1920 in wheat and oats it will be necessary to use registered seed on the field to be entered. The first step toward fulfilling this condition should be taken now.
