As given yesterday Secretary Grace received a message from Manager Goodland of our Halifax team stating that Tom Butler, competitor at an in-door sports held in Halifax Tuesday night under the auspices of the M.P.A.A.A. and won the 220 yards, and came second in the quarter mile. Practically the same competitors that took part in the Wanderers Sports were in the events, and Butler deserves every congratulation on adding two more trophies to those already acquired by the team. Phelan and Skirving did not compete. Manager Goodland's team leaves Halifax in time to connect with Saturday night's Kyle, and are due at Port aux Basques on Sunday morning, arriving here by Monday's express. It is understood that at several of the principal stations along the line the team will be extended a hearty welcome home, whilst judging from present indications Monday night's reception will be amongst the biggest of its kind to take place in St. John's. Practically all motor owners have signified their intention of being in the parade, whilst private citizens have hired taxis and will be in the big procession. Both Bell and his manager Mr. A. H. Thomas have left Halifax, and are now at Truro, working on the farm, and preparing for the big event which takes place on October 15th. Dear Sir,—At a meeting of the Executive and Road Committee of the Newfoundland Motor Association, held on the 24th inst., we were instructed to respectfully convey to you the following Resolution passed unanimously at that meeting—
"That if the Government decide to pass further grants for relief road work, the Road Committee recommended that such amounts be expended only upon the main highways, many of which are badly in need of repairs, citing for instance, that part of the road leading from Seal Cove to Holyrood commonly known as the "Cow Path," roads leading to Bay Roberts Holyrood to Salmonier, certain sections of the Southern Shore road and certain sections in the Eastern part of St. John's.
"The Executive and Road Committee further strongly recommend that all moneys expended in relief work should be expended under the direction and control of the Newfoundland Road Commission.
"The Road Committee further recommend that where bridges are unsafe and, consequently, need replacing, they should preferably be replaced by concrete and that in the case of smaller bridges, they should all be replaced by concrete culverts.
We were further instructed that copies of this letter should be sent to the Press with a request for publication in the interest of the general public.
