INTERESTING EVENT MONDAY EVENING

Other Townsmen also Honored
Guests at Dinner Given
At Riverside Hotel.

An event of great interest took place Monday evening when Mayor L. E. McFarland was host at a banquet given in honor of the Town Fathers and a number of other prominent citizens—twenty in all forming the party. The guests included, beside His Worship the Mayor, Councillors H. R. Nixon, C. W. McQuarrie, H. H. Hatfield, W. B. Nixon, M. W. White and A. Y. Dickinson; Town Clerk A. E. Plummer and Police Officer J. F. Murdock. The other invited gentlemen were Messrs. S. S. Miller, C. S. Baker, E. W. Laskey, R. B. Hagerman, J. E. McCollom, H. J. Alton, E. C. Morgan, F. A. Alton, R. L. York, C. Gordon Anslow and Rev. G. F. Bolster. All these gentlemen were present with the exception of S. S. Miller, H. H. Hatfield, C. G. Anslow, F. A. Alton and J. F. Murdock, who through various reasons were unable to be present.

The banquet was given at the Riverside Inn and Host Frank Plummer left nothing to be desired in the way of catering and all the guests did ample justice to a very fine full course turkey dinner which he provided. Seats were taken at the table at 8 o'clock and after the bountiful repast had been partaken of, Toastmaster E. C. Morgan arose proposing honors to His Majesty the King, which was heartily responded to by the singing of the National Anthem.

The next toast proposed was His Worship the Mayor. Mr. Morgan, in proposing this toast, gave in a very happy manner a brief life history of the Mayor up to date, saying some very complimentary things both of he and Mrs. McFarland. After the toast was drunk, followed by singing "For He's a Jolly Good Fellow." Mr. McFarland replied, thanking all present for the hearty manner in which the toast to him had been received. He said it afforded him great pleasure to be able to have for his guests the men that were before him. He stated that it was about two years since the town had first honored him by electing him Mayor, and he had felt that being elected for another term, he must have inspired the confidence of the townspeople to that extent. He felt highly honored and very grateful for the loyal support he had always received. He then went on taking up the public works that were carried out in the two years of his office. Space and time does not give opportunity to mention in detail Mr. McFarland's remarks along these lines. It would be good reading of a high instructive nature if we could do so. However, we will enumerate the points he took up which were: Public Works in 1923. One of the first things accomplished and which was very much appreciated was procuring a hitching yard for horses. 2. Straightening the street at depot crossing and moving switch. 3. Moving stock yard to Deep Creek. 4. Lighting the bridge, taking the matter up with the Government. 5. The laying of 325 feet of sidewalk some of it being ten feet wide, also making crossings and culverts. 7. Making extension of 700 feet to main water pipe, and laying 300 feet sewer pipe from top of Burt's Hill to Hillcrest. Public Works in 1924: 1. Making contract with Hartland Electric Co., and taking up the rates with the Public Utilities Commission. 2. Making settlement between the Town and County. 3. The laying of 280 feet
