The transcontinental railway ha been the favorite theme of Sir Wilfrid at all his meetings. This great pro is ject quite own conception, and will foreve be a monument to his sagacity and foresightedness. By means of the agreement with the Grand Trunk Pacific the public interests of Canada trifling expenditure in comparison with the immense advantages which must accrue to all portions of the Dominion.
