Hon. Mr. Mackenzie said that as the gentlemen in the treasury benches were the cause of the exodus any measure looking to the removal of that cause should receive its support. Hon. James McDonald introduced

bills for the winding up of insolvent banks and other incorporated com-panies to remove doubts as to the power to imprison with hard labor under the Act 32 and 33 Vic. chap. 28, and the Act 37 Vic. chap. 48, representing vagrants respecting oaths by employ es of Government telegraph lines. On House being moved into committee Mr. Blake moved an amendment in effect that the Government professed when in opposition a more

economical management of public affairs, should they resume reins of Government; that they had not fulfilled that promise but on the coutrary had FLOUR. 
