Six young women and three men were imprisoned for three hours in the elevator cage of the Trenton, N. J., battle monument, 100 feet above ground, when the machinery jammed.

It was announced at a luncheon in Montreal a few days ago by Mr. F. W. Gray, editor of the Canadian Mining Journal, that in the West lies the future workshop of Canada, that Canada has 17 per cent of the world's coal supply and 71 per cent of the supply of coal for the Empire.

Montreal, Feb. 28.—The body of Mrs. Daniel Smith, seventy-three years, dead many hours from cold and exposure, was found entangled in a barbed wire fence near a small wood. It is thought she lost her way and walked until she fell from exhaustion. Mrs. Smith came from Halifax, where two of her daughters live.

When the members of the German Delegation to the recent Reparations Conference in London arrived in that city, they were officially received by representatives of foreign Offices. Apart from that, their advent to London was treated with the greatest coldness. The railway porters refused to handle the baggage of the delegates.

At Petawa, Ont., recently, the two-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Chas. Kass, endeavored to swallow a bean, which lodged in his throat. In her excitement the mother ran some distance to the place where their husband was working, for assistance, and on their arrival the parents found the child dead, having choked to death.

The military authorities at Montreal are startled over the mysterious disappearance of Private Antonio Herbert, who was looked behind the bars of the citadel, awaiting his court-martial on thirteen counts of theft. Private Herbert left his cell while there were four guards on duty and a sentinel at the main gate of the citadel.

A little girl, five years old, was instantly killed at Newsway, N. B., on Sunday afternoon. She and a little playmate jumped on a sled loaded with logs for a ride. They had gone a short distance when the sled gave a lurch causing the guard stakes to give away, the logs rolling over the children. The little girl was instantly killed and her playmate badly injured.

At Ellsworth, N. Y., on February 28th, three bandits who had been captured a day or two before were arraigned in court and are alleged to have made confessions. They declared that twenty-one hold-ups and robberies in Union County could be laid to their charge. They faced personal sentences aggregating 150 years each. They realized only \$1,000 cash in all their depredations, they were forced to confess.

From Grimby, Ont., comes this information under the date of March 1st. Grimby village residents could scarcely believe their eyes last night when twenty cases of liquor were dished from a motor truck which had just taken on the liquor at the station. An innocent looking farmer who was driving the truck was apparently taken for a government officer. The occupants of the truck put on all speed and threw the engine into gear along the road in making away. The farmers gathered up a few of the cases, the rest going to the residents of the village.

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The Forty Hours' Devotion commenced yesterday morning at St. Dunstan's Cathedral at 9 p.m.

The total value of fresh fish taken in Prince Edward Island last year was \$736,325; in Nova Scotia \$8,763,000. Of the P. E. Island catch lobster accounted for \$497,243. The value of the lobster catch in Nova Scotia was \$2,555,735. The oyster crop of this province last year was valued at \$21,413 while that of Nova Scotia amounted to \$12,076. P. E. Island smelts were valued at \$10,900 while Nova Scotia smelt crop amounted to \$50,821.

A triple tragedy has been discovered by the monks of the St. Bernard Hospital (situated 1,110 feet above sea level) within a short distance of their own hospitable establishment at Grouse. The magnificent dogs which have been so long famous for their yowls were aroused by the sound of revolver shots. The monks immediately followed up the trail set by the dogs and discovered the bodies of three Italians lying in the snow. The dead men had evidently been foully murdered and then robbed. Their bodies were riddled with bullets.

Bad Accident At Railway Shop

While engaged in the work of making repairs to a locomotive under at the railway machine shop in Charlottetown yesterday a deplorable accident occurred as the result of which Mr. Frank Hale had his arm terribly crushed, necessitating its amputation later. It appears that as the tender was being hoisted the chain supporting it parted and in its fall Mr. Hale's arm was caught beneath it. It was some time before the tender could be removed and the unfortunate man suffered dreadfully. He was removed as soon as possible to P. E. Island Hospital where the arm was amputated below the elbow. At last accounts the patient was doing as well as could be expected. Mr. Hale has been employed in the mechanical department of the railway for the past twenty years, and this is the first serious accident that has ever befallen him. His many friends will be very sorry to learn of the unfortunate occurrence.

Shot His Brother

Pontiac, Mich., March 4.—Warren Brandfield, eleven years of age, was detained by the police here today, pending investigation into the killing in the woods near Farmington, yesterday, of his nine-year-old brother, Clare. The elder boy shot and killed his brother "to put him out of his misery," he said, after having accidentally wounded him while demonstrating his skill with a revolver.

According to Warren's statement to the Sheriff, he fired the shot in an effort to see how close he could come to his brother without hitting him. The younger lad tumbled at the shot and was struck in the side. Warren then placed the muzzle against the prostrated child's head and pulled the trigger, killing him instantly. "He wanted to put him out of his misery; I did not want to see him suffering," he said today.

Prince Edward Island Rules Relating to Private Bills.

36. All petitions for Private Bills must be presented within fourteen days after the commencement of the session exclusive of adjournment.

37. No Private Bill shall be brought into the House, but upon a petition first presented, truly stating the case at the peril of the suitors for such Bill, and such petition must be signed by the said parties.

38. A committee shall be appointed at the commencement of every Session consisting of five members of whom three shall be a quorum, to be denominated "The Private Bills Committee" to whom shall be referred every Private Bill, and no proceedings after the first reading shall be had upon such Bill until such Committee has reported thereon to the House.

39. So soon as the Committee has reported any Bill, such Bill together with any amendments that may be suggested by the Committee, shall be printed at the expense of the parties who are suitors for such Bill and printed copies thereof delivered to the members before the second reading if deemed necessary by the Committee.

40. No Bill for the particular interest of any person or persons, Corporation or Corporations or body or bodies of people shall be read a second time until all fees be paid for the same into the hands of the Clerk of the House.

41. No Bill having for its object the vesting in or conferring upon any person or persons, Municipality or Body corporate the title to any tract of land shall be received or read in the House unless at least four weeks notice containing a full description of the land in question has been published in the Royal Gazette and one other newspaper in this Province of the intention of such person or persons Municipality or body Corporate to apply for such Bill.

Land Regulations

The sole head of a family, a male over 18 years old, who was at the commencement of the present war and who has since continued to be a British subject or a subject of an allied or associated country, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta.

Applications must appear in person at Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency in District. Entry by proxy may be made on certain conditions. Duties: six months residence upon and cultivation of land in each of three years. In certain districts a homesteader may secure an adjoining quarter-section as pre-emption. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties: six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 extra acres. May obtain pre-emption patent as soon as homestead patent on certain conditions.

A settler after obtaining homestead patent, if he cannot secure a pre-emption, may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and a house worth \$30.00.

When Dominion Lands are "dormant" or posted for entry, prior to settlement, who have served overseas and have been honorably discharged, receive one day priority in applying for entry at local Agent's Office that not (Sub-Agency). Discharge papers must be presented to Agent.

Records of entries may consult time of employment as far as names in Canada during 1917, as residence dates under certain conditions.
