EDMONTON'S NEW COURT HOUSE.

The new \$200,000 court house, for which the contract was let last fail to A. Manson for the exterior work, is progressing very favorably. Already the cement foundations have been completed and material is being forwarded daily for the steel construction. Large cranes have been erected to swing the steel girders into * place where required.
