## In the Assembly

When the House met yesterday Mr. Kent presented a petition from Mr. McCaffrey on behalf of the Tanners, asking that they be made the same as that on the finished article. Mr. Kent strongly supported the petition and recommended its consideration by the Minister of Finance and Customs.

Mr. Clapp presented a petition from the people of LaSalle for a grant of \$1,000 to complete the public wharf there by adding three more blocks to it so that freight and passengers could be handled with more facility. This is a growing place and Mr. Clapp hoped the Government would accede to the prayer of the petition.

Mr. Earle presented petitions from Fogo, Seldom-Come-By, Barr'd Islands, Horwood and Carmanville for public wharves, telegraphs, half-way houses, etc.

Mr. Moore, from Horse Cove, re amendment to fishery laws.

Hon. S. D. Blandford, re mills.

Mr. Downey, from Pointe's Crossing and Rattling Brook for roads.

Hon. C. Emerson, from Conn River, for a bridge.

Mr. Devereaux, from Haystack, for a road; and Mr. Kent from Torbay on roads.

A Bill to amend the Game and Inland Fisheries Act of 1910 was introduced by the Minister of Marine and Fisheries, and read a first time.

The Pilotage and Old Age Pension Bills were passed and sent to the Upper House for its concurrence.

The Fire Patrol Bill passed the committee stage, and the Marine Insurance Bill was read a second time and referred to the following select committee:—Hon. Col. Secretary, Messrs. F. J. Morris, Earle, Goodison and Shea.

The Western Union Cable Bill and the Direct United States Cable Bill were read a second time and will go into committee to-day.

The Minister of Finance and Customs tabled the report of the Auditor General on the Revenue and Appropriation Acts for the fiscal year 1909-1910.

Mr. Gear gave notice of question re special marine and road grants in the District of Lunenburg.

When the Assembly opened yesterday His Honor the Speaker read the following message from His Excellency the Governor:

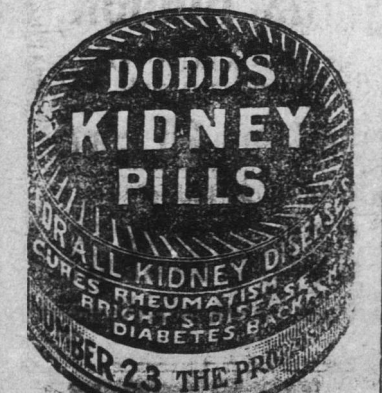

## More Sealing News.

### Steel Ships Slowly Loading—No Definite News of the Wooden Fleet Yet.

Early yesterday afternoon Messrs. A. J. Harvey & Coy., had the following wireless message from Capt. Jacob Kean of the Adventure:

"Sunday evening—Eleven thousand and on board, 4,000 panned. Think I am in the main patch. Chances good. Other steel ships in company. Blinding snowstorm."

This message was received from the Bellaventure:

"Sunday, 7 p.m.—Funks S. W. 34 S. 104 miles; 14,000 on board; no panned. Chances for more seals to-morrow good. Think I am in main patch."

At 3 p.m. yesterday Messrs. Bowring Bros. received the following wireless from the Florizel, despatched from the ship at noon Sunday:

"My crew panned 13,700 Saturday. Total panned and on board 24,700. Rost of steel ships went westward of seals, did not do much. The Eagle and Algerine in sight, and one more smoke W.S.W. of us. Prospects good. Weight total 27 lbs."

At 4 p.m. yesterday Messrs. A. J. Harvey & Coy. had the following from Capt. J. Parsons of the Bonaventure:

"Sunday evening—10,000 on board and 8,000 panned. Chances for securing more seals good. Think I am in the main patch."

From the messages received St. Patrick's Day and Saturday last the idea was entertained that the 'Dreadnoughts' were in the main patch but fares secured to date are not as large as might be expected had such been the case. The approximate totals killed and panned by the steel ships to date are:

Florizel	24,700
Bellaventure	14,000
Bonaventure	18,000
Adventure	15,000
Beothic	18,000
Total	\$9,700

There is much conjecture as to what the wooden fleet is doing. It seems to be ominous that no messages have been received from the Eagle and Neptune both fitted with wireless. The seals to date are light in weight but must soon be in fine condition. The prospects for the whole fleet do not seem to be very bright, the spring is yet early and in a few days we may have good reports from the old as well as the new vessels.

## Newfoundland Has 5,000 Seals.

Messrs. A. J. Harvey & Coy. had the following wireless message at midnight from Capt. Kean of the S. S. Newfoundland, via Belle Isle and Quebec:

Reversing engine broke March 15, delayed 12 hours, putting up hand-gear when steel fleet passed me, ship almost unmanageable with hand-gear. Struck seals March 17, 5,000 on board. Consider prospects good."

It would appear from the foregoing that the Newfoundland was in the seals as early as the steel ships and that but for the mishap reported, causing delay to her she would have had more seals up to the time the wireless was sent. It is thought that her presence in the seals so early may indicate encouraging prospects for the wooden ships.

## Vessel Lost Last Night

The Customs Authorities were apprised this morning that the American schooner Colonial, ran ashore at Burgeo in the storm of last night and became a total wreck, her crew escaping. The vessel was owned in Gloucester, was fishing on the coast and was built at Essex in 1902. She was a vessel of 37 tons burden and was a fine craft of her class.

## Plague in Trinidad.

At the Office for the Dead the chanters were Rt. Rev. Mgr. Roche and Rev. D. O'Callaghan; the lessons were read by Rev. P. Kelly, Rev. D. O'Callaghan and His Grace the Archbishop. After the "Requiem" had been sung Solenn High Mass was celebrated by Rt. Rev. Mgr. Roche, with Rev. Frs. O'Callaghan and Kelly as Deacon and Sub-Deacon. His Grace pronounced the Absolution at the catafalque, after which the funeral procession formed:—cross bearer and candle bearers, acolytes, children of the Convent Schools, Children of Mary, Nuns, Clergy, coffin, friends of the deceased Nun, and wended its way to the quiet little Convent cemetery where "neath the pure snow and with a bright sun shining and giving hope of a happy eternal life already attained the body of Mother Teresa Halpin, a worthy Religious, a noble hearted daughter of Nano Nagle and a model of every virtue was consigned to mother earth to await the resurrection morn and to hear the welcome words: "Come, possess the Kingdom prepared for thee."

At the graveside the final absolution was given by Rt. Rev. Mgr. Roche. "To live in hearts we leave behind is not to die."
