Need of Water Supply.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,—Owing to the inconsiderate actions of the persons who dumped refuse matter near a well from which several residents on Pennywell Road get their supply of drinking water, the need of the extension of the water system to this section of the town was brought forcibly to the notice of the Council. When the matter was reported to the Health authorities they acted promptly and Inspector O'Brien visited the place, made a thorough inspection, ordered the objectionable matter to be removed, pronounced the water polluted, and advised the residents not to use it. He has since visited the place twice to see if his orders were being carried out.

The nearest hydrant is about five minutes' walk from the residents whom this pollution affects, and their inconvenience can be easily imagined by any one who knows the locality when it is understood that they have to go from the vicinity of Hayward's and Coady's cottages to the junction of Pennywell Road and Boncloddy Street for water for domestic purposes. For this reason alone it would be worth while for the Council to give some consideration to the question of extending the water supply in that direction. But this water supply to a score or so of families is a matter that the City Fathers may not deem of sufficient importance for their consideration, for after all it affects only an insignificant section of the town, the residents of which are mere mechanics, clerks and laborers. But there is a more serious aspect to this absence of water supply on Pennywell Road which was not touched by your correspondent, "Rocky Lane." It may be a matter of indifference to the City Council and to the citizens in general whether the people in this section of the town get pure water for their domestic uses, or that themselves and children have, by necessity, to use polluted and typhoid germ-infected water throughout the summer months. I know of no reason why this should concern the public; but the protection of the city against fire concerns all, and for this reason they should be interested in the extension of water the full length of Pennywell Road.

Only a couple or three years ago there were very few houses west of Boncloddy Street; today there is almost an unbroken row of frame dwellings, finished or in course of construction, extending from Boncloddy Street to the junction of Pennywell Road and Rocky Lane, on the south side, and on the north side almost as many more. In case of fire starting along this thoroughfare while a strong wind blew from any point from south to northwest, no human agency could under existing conditions cope with it, and I hazard the opinion that all the fire-fighting men and apparatus at the disposal of this city at the present moment would have a difficult task to prevent the fire from sweeping the city from its place of origin to Holytown. It stands like a volcano over the city below menacing it and neither the City Council nor those upon whom rests the responsibility for fire protection can afford to very much longer ignore this condition of affairs, and it is doubtful if they can regard it as consistent with their duty to defer action towards safeguarding, as far as in their power lies, the city from the danger of a repetition of the devastation of 1892.

Our Montreal Letter.

Mayor Ellis Nearly Recovered From His Recent Operation at the Royal Victoria Hospital—Will Leave the Hospital next Week, and will then Spend a Few Weeks Resting before Returning to St. John's.—W. Savin, also a Patient at the Hospital, His Grace Archbishop Bruchesi Confirms Twenty-Five Thousand Children in One Week

(Special to the Evening Telegram.) His Worship Mayor Ellis who entered the Royal Victoria Hospital about two weeks ago is nearly recovered from the operation performed on him for appendicitis. For three days after the operation he hovered between life and death, but his robust constitution won out, and he is gradually gaining strength. All danger of complications of any kind setting in is now past, and Dr. Garrow is confident that the Mayor will now enjoy better health now than for years past. Friday, May 12, the Mayor was able to be up for the first time since the operation. Your correspondent has visited him several times, the last one being this afternoon when he was sitting up for a few hours. He is visited by several Newfoundland friends here, and he is kept in constant touch on matters in Newfoundland as he receives the home papers besides several letters. Next week he is to leave the hospital, but he will not return home immediately. He intends to spend a few weeks resting and studying Montreal's Municipal Work before going back.

William Savin who arrived here a few days ago will enter the Royal Victoria Hospital next week to undergo an operation similar to that of Mayor Ellis.

Twenty-Five Thousand Confirmed. Last week His Grace Archbishop Bruchesi assisted by five other Bishops confirmed twenty-five thousand (25,000) children. This is a record. Personally His Grace confirmed eleven hundred (1100) in one parish, that of St. Jean Baptiste. In St. Patrick's he confirmed 500, fifty-five of that number being converts, the first fruits of the non-Catholic mission preached by the eloquent Paulist Fathers Burke and Conway from New York City.

"Tag" Day held last month in aid of a School for the Blind, was a great success. The sum of \$25,000 being realized. Another "Tag" Day is to be held on Victoria Day, May 23rd, under the auspices of the National Council of Women, and the Federation Nationale of this city. It is expected to be a great success. If the weather is favorable the taggers are to wear white gowns with red belts, to which the tags will be fastened. The French ladies will have charge of that part of the city east of St. Lawrence Main St., the Council west of Windsor St., while the intermediate territory will be shared between the two. Six hundred yards of red, white and blue bunting have been cut up to make 20,000 horse rosettes and 1,400 motor pennants, while 400,000 tags have been ordered, red with a white ground, and in English on one side and in French on the other. These will be divided equally for sale by the two organizations, Dr. Ritchie England being convener of the central committee.

A large number of women's clubs throughout the city have undertaken to make the rosettes and pennants and are now busily engaged in the task.

The fourteen affiliated societies whose charities will benefit by the day include the Victorian Order of Nurses, the Parks and Playgrounds Association, the Royal Edward Institute, the Day Nursery, the Hervey Institute, the Hebrew Ladies' Benevolent Society, the Victoria Sunshine Society for the Grace Dawn Home, the Alumnæ for the University Settlement, the Protestant Infants' Home, the Ladies' Benevolent Society, and the King's Daughters for the Creche and Good Will Society.

The Papal Delegate to Visit St. John's.
