### Vicious Attacks

#### On Sir Robert Bond and the Savings Bank.

The most absurd and vicious attacks that have ever disgraced Election campaigns in Newfoundland are those associated with McGrath. The worst of all are those he is engaging in now, for he not only makes a vile attack on the honour and integrity of Sir Robert Bond but he is trying to raise a scare against the Government Savings Bank, which is calculated to embarrass an institution which it is the manifest duty of every one to safeguard, but more particularly is it the duty of the Government who are responsible for the safety of the institution. What are the Hon. Sir E. P. Morris, John R. Bennett, R. A. Squires and M. J. Kennedy, who are among the Governors of the Savings Bank doing to protect it against the malicious attacks of Mr. P. T. McGrath? Are these men content to stand for these attacks of McGrath and to stand as Governors of the Savings Bank at one and the same time? McGrath boasts that he fooled the people in 1909 on a Confederation scare to vote for the People's Party. McGrath tried to raise a scare on Non-Sectarian education and failed. McGrath compared Coaker to Dowie, and tried to ruin the commercial enterprises which are associated with the Fishermen's Protective Union movement, and failed miserably. Driven to despair, he is now trying to instil fear into the breasts of the fishermen that their money will not be safe in the Government Savings Bank, and he does not stop at this bank, for he includes other banks. Of all persons in the whole of Newfoundland with whom he could have associated such a scare, Sir Robert Bond is the least vulnerable, for with no other person's name is the safety of that bank more indissolubly bound than that of Robert Bond. The security of the Savings Bank ultimately rests on the solvency of the Colony. Sir Robert Bond saved the Colony from insolvency in 1895, and in that way indirectly saved the Savings Bank. But he did more. He saved the Savings Bank directly, and the Governors of the Savings Bank passed a resolution telling what he did and thanking him for doing it. When the Savings Bank was in need of a loan after the Crash in May 1895 he raised a loan in Canada for \$150,000 at 5 per cent. per annum. \$100,000 of this he could obtain only by rendering himself personally responsible to the

lenders. This is the testimony of the Governors themselves and given over the signature of the late Cashier, the Hon. E. D. Shea, and is a matter of public knowledge for this letter had been published previously in the columns of *The Evening Telegram*. Can those who are making this attack on Sir Robert Bond deny that he gave the security mentioned in these resolutions? Can those who are hoping to take political advantage of this attack on the Savings Bank deny that Sir Robert furnished the guarantee for this loan? We challenge them to do so. Not only did Sir Robert save the Bank by his personal credit by this short loan, but he raised a loan for the Savings Bank in London in the following July of £270,000 sterling and placed the safety of the bank beyond peradventure. Yet the man who has done more for the safety of the Savings Bank than any man in the country is the target of McGrath's scare about the safety of that institution. Just as in 1895 every villification was practised in order to ruin the chances of Robert Bond's mission to save the Colony from insolvency and the Savings Bank from embarrassment, so today journalistic attempts are being made to defame Sir Robert Bond at a time the people are looking to him to retrieve the country from the wild expenditure and extravagance of the past four years. In 1895 McGrath tried every devilish expedient to ruin Newfoundland's credit at the time Robert Bond was straining every nerve to save it. On May 16th, 1895, McGrath wrote in the *Evening Herald*:—"The intelligence in to-day's message that Hon. R. Bond has failed to negotiate a loan in Montreal and has proceeded to the United States is disheartening, will severely surprise anybody. We must be taken charge of by England's Commissioners in June next." On June 24th, 1895, McGrath published the following insulting and unpatriotic gibe at his native land, and this was the very date on which the *Halifax Chronicle* announced from London—"Bond's Loan Successful." Here is McGrath's gibe at Newfoundland:—"For sale to satisfy a mortgage,

all that valuable piece of land, situated in the North Atlantic, and known as Newfoundland, the oldest British Colony; Going, Going." On the same date, too, McGrath in the *Evening Herald*, attacked the Savings Bank in these words:—"It is better for people to have their money in a world-renowned institution like the Bank of Montreal than in a Savings Bank, the deposits in which a Government guarantees and then mortgages over our revenue to outsiders." In 1895, McGrath attacked the Savings Bank and Bond's efforts to save it and the Colony. To-day he is attacking, as he did then, the same person, and the same bank in the interest of the Grubbers. Now who will voters trust? The man who saved the Savings Bank in 1895, or McGrath's leader? Who will the voter trust the man who saved the credit of the Colony in 1895 or the man who has been spending public money recklessly since 1909? Shall it be Bond, who risked everything he possessed for his country, or the man who has been grabbing all they could the past four years?

Colville, of H. M. S. Cornwall. The bride was charmingly attired and given away by her father, His Lordship the Bishop of Newfoundland, assisted by Rev. Mr. Goudge, the chaplain of the Cathedral, performed the ceremony, which took place at 3 p.m. The Cathedral was filled by the many friends of the bride and groom, the officers and the cadets of the Cornwall. After the ceremony the sailors attached ropes to the carriage of Mrs. Augustus Harvey, which had been lent for the occasion, and drew the Lieut. Nansell and his charming bride home, in the grounds in front of the house. A large marquee has been erected and was utilized for the reception of guests. The presents were most numerous and valuable and came from Newfoundland, Canada, England and the States. We extend to Lieut. and Mrs. Colville our warmest wishes for many years of happiness.
