Russia's Position.

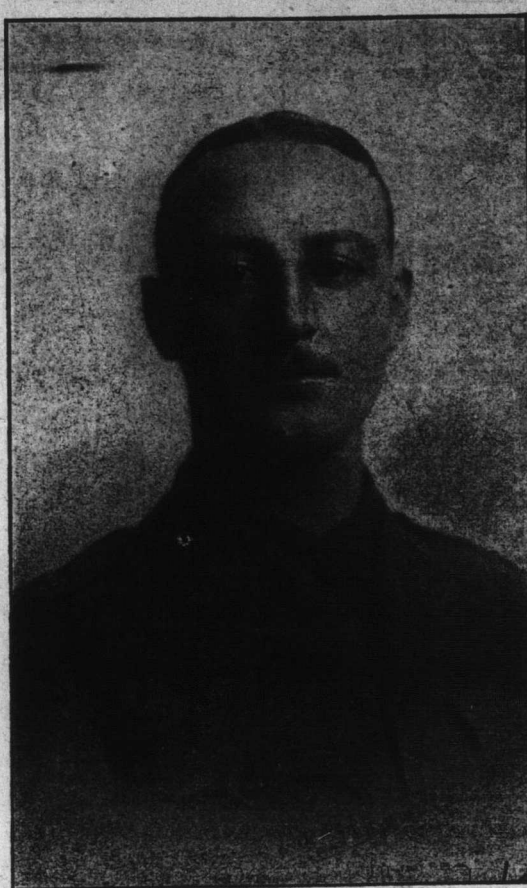
A treaty of peace between the German Government and the Bolsheviks who are temporary tenants of some of the Government buildings in Petrograd, a treaty professing to take Russia out of the war, would have about as much value to Germany as King Constantine's agreement to enter the war against the Allies with all the military power of Greece would have had on the eve of his dethronement and forced departure from Athens. This story is evidently of Teutonic origin, like the Vienna report that the Grand Duke Nicholas was placing himself at the head of the forces opposed to the Bolsheviks with the purpose of restoring the Empire with himself as ruler. That invention had the perfectly obvious purpose of making the soldiers of the Russian army believe that in supporting any movement against the Petrograd gang they were really fighting to put down the revolution. The report of a separate peace made by Russia is but the repetition of a story often heard.

We may suppose that the report about a separate peace does not misrepresent the disposition of Lenin and Trotsky. It has been repeatedly charged and it is generally believed that they are German agents in Germany and there is much supporting evidence. The important point is that they are quite without power to commit the Russian nation. As the remarkable dispatch from our Petrograd correspondent printed yesterday makes plain, Russia is in a condition comparable to that of the human body in suspended animation. The vital processes go on, there is nothing to stop them; but the power of thought and voluntary action is no longer capable of being exerted. At the moment Russia is without a Government, it is incapable of making peace. It is unlikely that the majority of the people will heed a declaration that the war is ended coming from the Bolsheviks and Russia's allies would pay no attention to it, they would decline to consider Russia a neutral nation. Our Government has very wisely decided to withhold supplies of all kinds from Russia until some responsible government has been established with which we can do business. Potsdam might, for effect on the German people, declare that Russia has made peace, but in view of the great danger that Russia might again soon be at war it is extremely probable that large numbers of German divisions would remain upon the eastern front.—N. Y. Times.

2ND LIEUTENANT ARTHUR J. HERDER.

Died of Wounds, December 1st.

The casualty list received last night contained the sad intelligence that 2nd Lieut. Arthur J. Herder had given his life in the great cause. He was the eldest son of Mr. W. J. Herder, Proprietor of The Evening Telegram, and is the second of his sons to be killed in action with the Newfoundland Regiment; his brother Hubert fell on July 1st, 1916. The blow is not only felt by his bereaved family, on whom the sorrows of the war have fallen thus heavily, but by the city, where the gallant soldier was well known, and by a host of friends in other parts of the world.

Arthur Herder was born in this city on January 28th, 1883. He received his education at the Methodist College, among the records of which, both scholastic and athletic, his name will always have a high place. In the popular memory he will be chiefly kept in mind for his athletic prowess, for he was a footballer of the first rank and a foremost figure in the early days of hockey in Newfoundland. In the latter respect there was nothing surprising, for he was but the first of a family which has since produced almost a full team of hockey-ists of championship calibre. In 1901, having completed his school education, he entered Jesus College, Cambridge. Here again, although he obtained an honours degree, and was knighted by the English Bar, his scholastic achievements. He speedily became prominent on the running track and was a "find" for his College in the rugby field. But his chief distinction was in rowing. He was a tower of strength to his College Eight and in his last year at Cambridge missed the much coveted "blue" by one place only, being the first reserve of the "Varsity" crew. Having obtained his degree and bar certificate, he returned to Newfoundland and took up the practice of law immediately, being for some years a partner in the firm of Howley & Herder. Seeking a larger sphere he went, a few years ago, to Western Canada, and the war found him at Swiftcurrent, Saskatchewan, where he enlisted at once, while his brothers Hubert and Ralph were answering the call here. He went over in the Swiftcurrent Light Horse with the first Canadian reinforcements in May, 1915. The following winter he was transferred at his own request, to the Newfoundland Regiment. In the dawn of the immortal July 1st the three brothers went over the top together. Hubert was killed, Ralph wounded in the face and Arthur badly wounded in both shoulders. He was long in hospital and left it, not completely cured, last winter. During his convalescence he married, in April, Madge Lindsay, of Lynwood, Afr. A few days later he was sent again to the front in France, and, being promoted to the rank of Second Lieutenant, led his men in every engagement in which the Regiment has since participated. He has now crowned a fine record of service with the greatest of human acts, giving his life for the cause and for his fellow men and dying as he would have wished to die, in harness. He leaves the memory of another great example behind him and adds another to the long roll of heroes that is the proud boast of Newfoundland. The Telegram adds its own to the deep and general sympathy that is extended to the brave soldier's family and wife in their bereavement.

Stars Predict Fall of the Kaiser.

Ellicottville, N.Y., Nov. 24.—In seven months from now Kaiser Bill will step down and out, with him will go twelve wilful men high in the German empire to-day and the war will be a thing of the past.

This in brief is the prophecy of Arthur Logan, a farmer-astronomer and all-around genius who lives north-east of this village near the village of Bird. Logan has been prophesying for many years and he has quite a number of followers in and near this village. It is claimed that he predicted the Italian disaster long before it happened.

The system he uses is very simple.

"In the last seven nights," he says, "I have watched the sky and I have seen 13 stars fall earthward. These 13 stars are the military men of Germany. Each night represents a month of time. One by one the stars of Germany will fall. The first will be the premier, and then the military idols. The last will be the bright star in the east, which represents the Kaiser himself."

Farmers near here are interested in the prophecy and they claim that the stars have been acting very strangely in the past week.
