### The Passing of John C. Bagg, J.P.

The sudden death of Mr. John C. Bagg, J.P., of the firm of Bagg Brothers, last Thursday evening, at the thers, last Thursday evening, at the age of 56 years, came as a shock to this community, for although deceased suffered much of recent years, yet the past fall he had improved considerably in health and it was hoped that he was on the road to complete recovery. In fact only Thursday he remarked that he had not felt better for years. Mr. Bagg was in the store attending to business when about 4 p.m. Thursday he was stricken with paralysis and had to be conveyed to his home and had to be conveyed to his home where he expired about three ard a half hours later. Mr. Bagg was a man of amiable disposition and sound and impartial judgment; his sterling integrity in matters of busi-ness were known far and wide; and when permitted by health he manifested a keen interest in all matters tending to the improvement of the community and the betterment of its people. For years he was warden for S. Mary's Church, and also a member of the Board of Education. He also held a commission as Justice of the Peace for the Colony. As a hunter until recent years he had few equals, and no peers in this country, while with the rod he seemed to be quite at home. A few years ago his cidest son, William was drowned in Sandy River, while returning from a hunting trip, and from the shock of that tragedy it might be said Mr. Bagg never fully recovered. Interment took place Saturday afternoon, and the remains were followed to their last resting place by a large concourse of people, all the business places closing out of respect to the deceas-ed member of the trade.—Western




