## Assassination of Irish M.P.

Field Marshal Sir Henry Wilson Shot on Own Doorstep---Phoenix Park Murders Recalled---Prince of Wales Gets Enthusiastic Welcome Home---British Government Suffer Two Defeats.

### FIELD MARCHAL WILSON SHOT.

LONDON, June 22. Field Marshal Sir Henry Wilson was shot and killed outside his house on Grosvenor Square, London to-day. Two assassins were arrested. Sir Henry was formerly Chief of the General Staff of the British Army. He retired this year and was elected Unionist member for the Imperial Parliament for North Down, Ireland. In March he went to Belfast with plans for restoring order which he submitted to the Premier. The names of the two men arrested are given as Connolly and McBrien. Wilson was struck by three shots and died immediately. He had been under police protection for some time. Police were at the door of his house when the shooting occurred. One policeman was wounded by the assassin. In the Commons Austin Chamberlain announced the death of the Field Marshal and the House adjourned as a mark of mourning. News of the assassination of Wilson has caused a sensation at Belfast. Sinn Feiners are particularly blamed and reprisals are feared. Policeman Marsh, who was with Field Marshal Wilson when he was shot, died later in hospital of wounds received. The assassin lay in wait outside the Field Marshal's home and killed him as he alighted from a car. With the courage and presence of mind of a true soldier he saw his sword when he realized he was being attacked, and was about to charge it into one of his assailants when a fusillade of bullets from the crowd man laid him low. Lady Wilson bearing the shots and cries of the crowd emerged from her sitting room to see her wounded husband. His hand lay by his side, his gloved hand resting on the hilt. She grasped his hand and raised his head. "He is dying, he is dying," she cried frantically to a group of laborers repairing the sidewalk in front of the house, "Isn't there someone who can help, cannot someone bring a doctor?" The Field Marshal lay without sign of life. The servants carried him into the house. After their capture the men were taken to the police station where the taller of the two, apparently the leader, lay on the floor owing to injuries. A civilian asked him, "who are you?" He replied, "I am an Irishman. I could have got more of you chaps if I had not been afraid of hitting the kids." The civilian said "you are a dirty blackguard." All London was horrified by the tragedy. The House of Commons adjourned after sympathetic speeches by Asquith and Chamberlain. The King cancelled to-morrow evening's birthday dinner for the Prince of Wales and would have postponed to-night's court but it was too late. The newspapers demand measures to keep England free of Irish gunmen and their terrorism.

(Field-Marshal Sir Henry Hughes Wilson, Bart, was born on May 8th, 1864, the son of James Wilson, D.L., J.P., of Carrigane, Edgeworthstown, Ireland. He was educated at Marlborough College and graduated at the Staff College. In 1884, he entered the Royal Irish Regiment and in the same year was transferred to the Rifle Brigade. He served in the Burma Campaign of 1885-87 and was wounded. After recovering from his wounds he served again with his regiment until 1889 and was awarded the campaign medal with two clasps. In 1891 he married Cecil Mary, daughter of the late George Gore Wray, J.P., of Ardnamona, Donegal. From 1893-94 he was attached to the Staff College and from then until 1897, was a Staff Captain in the Intelligence Department.

From then his rise in the service was almost meteoric. He went out to South Africa in 1899 as a Brigade Major and while there earned his promotion to Lieut.-Col., was mentioned in despatches four times, and was awarded the D.S.O. From 1902 to 1914 his promotion was rapid, and at the entry of Great Britain into the European War, he went as Assistant Chief of General Staff to Earl French of Ypres. In 1915, he was created a K.C.B. and in 1917 was appointed British Military representative at Versailles. He was created a G.C.B. in 1918, and from that year was chief of the Imperial General Staff and a member of the War Cabinet. In 1919 he was made a Field Marshal and was also created a baronet. Only a few months ago he was elected a Unionist member of Parliament and was hailed as the first Field Marshal to sit in the House. Sir Henry possessed many foreign orders, which included the Grand Cross of the Legion of Honour and the Grand Cross of the Russian White Eagle.)

### MEMBER OF REPUBLICAN ARMY.

LONDON, June 22. It was stated at Scotland Yard to-night that correspondence had been found in possession of James Connolly, one of the two men arrested for the murder of Field Marshal Wilson, proving beyond a doubt he was a member of the Irish Republican Army.

### THE RETURN OF THE PRINCE.

LONDON, June 22. The Prince of Wales returned to London to-day after an eight months' tour. He was greeted affectionately by the King, Queen and other members of the Royal family. Paddington station was ablaze with flags while the streets along the route to the Palace were packed with crowds eager to join in the celebration.

### THE KING'S GRATITUDE.

LONDON, June 22. The King has issued the following message from Buckingham Palace. "The Queen and I are greatly touched at to-day's demonstration. Our joy in welcoming our dear son was increased by the affection and enthusiasm of his reception and the vast crowds assembled to greet him. He has safely returned from a long and responsible tour, and I am confident that my people share in our humble thanks to God for this happy and memorable day."

### DEFEAT IN HOUSE.

LONDON, June 22. The Government was defeated on a financial amendment to the National Health Insurance Bill in Grand Committee of the Commons to-day. The Committee immediately adjourned in order that the Government might consider its position. The amendment was carried by a vote of 20 to 14. The defeat is considered of no greater importance than that which occurred in the House of Lords yesterday, and is unlikely to lead to a modification of the Government's policy.

### GOVT. DEFEATED IN LORDS.

LONDON, June 22. The Government was defeated in the House of Lords to-day when Lord Haldington's motion condemning the Palestine mandate was adopted by a vote of sixty to twenty-one, following a vigorous defence of the Government's policy by the Earl of Balfour.

### MINERS FATAL CLASH.

PERRIN, Ills., June 22. Twenty-six and probably over thirty, have been killed in hostilities between striking Union miners and employees of the strip mines of the Southern Illinois Coal Co. near here.

### IRISH ELECTIONS.

DUBLIN, June 22. To-night's standing in the Free State Election is Pro-Treaty, 55; Anti-Treaty, 33; Labor, 15; Independent, 6.

Farmers, 5; Trinity College, 4; to be heard from, 10.

### HONORS UNMERTED.

LONDON, June 22. Fifteen members of the Commons have agreed to support submission of a motion for the appointment of a Select Committee to consider the system under which honors are conferred, the idea being to discover what changes, if any, are necessary to ensure that honors shall be given only as rewards of public service.

### SIR MONTAGUE ALLAN ACQUITTED.

MONTREAL, June 22. The charge against Sir Montague Allan, former President of the Merchants' Bank, that he negligently signed a false return of the Bank's affairs to the Dominion Government was dismissed here to-day in the Supreme Court.

### Super Airplane Now Designed.

A super airplane that is intended to fly from Paris to New York is an invention taking shape in the designing offices of Louis Breguet, the French inventor and aviator. According to information received in London, the machine is being built on the order of a Franco-American group. So huge is the flying machine that it can be entered by the wings, which measure seven feet from top to bottom. They are hollow. The plane will be fitted with a battery of engines developing thousands of horsepower. Breguet states his belief that when the great high altitude winds above oceans can be plotted with accuracy, it would be possible for the great flying machine to soar up into the mighty trade winds six miles or more higher and whirl from Europe to America in 10 to 15 hours. In such machines oxygen would be fed automatically into the cabin.

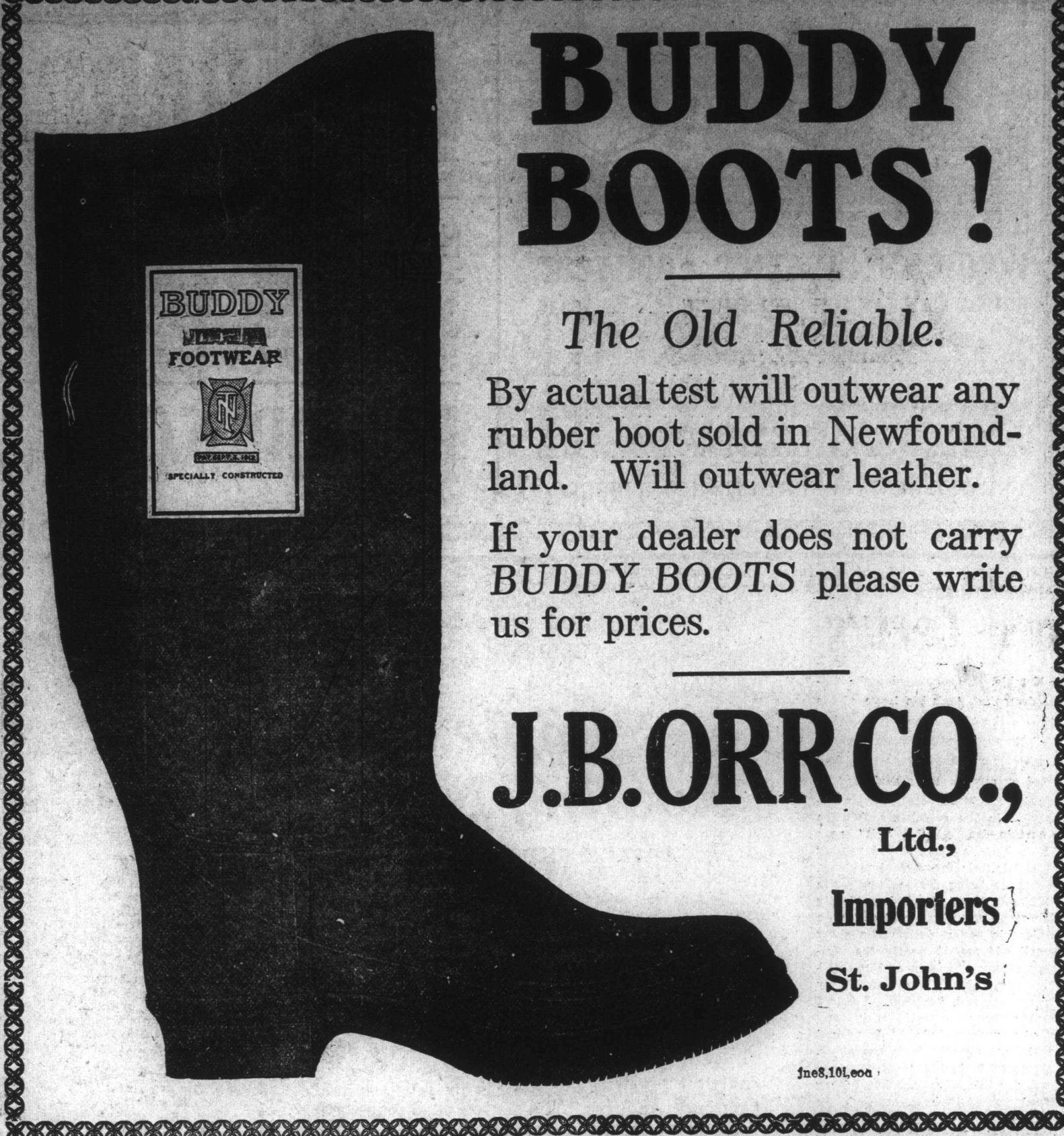

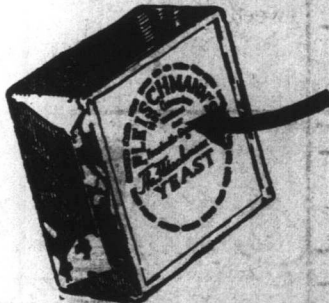
### The Trumpeter of Cracon.

"Centuries ago the Church of St. Mary's, Cracon, had been an outpost of Christendom, used as a watch tower against the invading Tartar; a soldier had been kept continually stationed there to give warning on a trumpet of the first approach of danger. In the fourteenth century, whilst the city, the trumpet had been struck in the throat by an arrow. His call had faltered, rallied and sunk. With his dying breath he had sounded a final blast, which had broken off short. The broken call had saved Cracon. Ever since to commemorate his faithfulness, there has never been an hour, day or night, when his broken trumpet-call, ending abruptly in an abyss of silence, has not been sounded, from the tower."—Coningsby Dawson in his new book "The Vanishing Point."

### Volcanic Deposits.

There have been reported the results of physical chemical and biological studies of the ash deposits in the Carib country of St. Vincent laid down at the time of the eruptions of the Soufriere in 1902 and 1903. The deposits, which range in depth from 14 to 18 inches, consist of coarse, sandy types. They show small contents of organic carbon and nitrogen, are extremely deficient in calcium carbonate and contain moderate amounts of available phosphoric acid and potash. They give evidence of a moderate activity of putrefactive bacteria. Nitrogen-fixing organisms, of the Azotobacter type are present. The soil possesses appreciable nitrogen-fixing and ammonifying power, but no nitrifying power. Considerable progress has been made in the conversion of these sterile ash deposits into fertile soil.—Washington Star.
