



Conferences have collected as follows: Toronto, \$1,-206,871.65; London, \$525,812.23; Hamilton, \$586,287.34; Bay of Quinte, \$362,742.43; Montreal, \$545,125.52; Nova Scotia, \$165,436.94; New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, \$161,-305.29; Newfoundland, \$29,689.53; Manitoba, \$220,402.29; Saskatchewan, \$179,629.78; Alberta, \$72,606.84; Brit-

ish Columbia, \$122,633,70. The missionary society is benefitting in enlarged permanent trust funds, from the income of which mission buildings are erected. The endowment of the superannuation fund has been increased by \$1,491,500. Western Canada colleges have had some large debts paid. By the end of May the fund is expected to total \$4.300,000.
