new postal regulations have been received at the Post Office in this Town. There are seven denominations of them, ranging from haif a cent in value up to fifteen cents. The stamps now in use in the several Provinces may be accepted as at present in payment of letters &c, for a reasonable time after the first of April; but when the "reasonable time" has exbut when the "reasonable time" has expired the new stamps alone must be used. As a device the beaver crouched on his little stick has been abolished, and all the stamps bear a profile effigy of Her Majesty, the face turned towards her left; and, of course, to the right of the person looking at it. The half cent stamps for the use of publishers who may choose (if any choose) to prepay newspapers to their sub-scribers is dark, almost black, and of a convenent size. All the others are rather large, and the device instead of being contained in an elliptical ring, as we have been accustomed to see, it is enclosed by a circular one and the breadth of the stamp is thus considerably increased without any enlargement of the effigy. 
