advices to the 6th instant say the Vienna Patent Congress has adopted the follow ing resolutions :-- 1st. That only the inventor himself or his legal succe shall obtain a patent; the granting of a 2nd. The donation of a patent for an invention to be for fifteen years, or for a shorter term with the option of extending it to that period. 3rd. The complete publication of the patent to be obligatory. 4th. The expense of granting a patent to be established on a moderate but probe established on a moderate but pro-gressive scale. 5th. A specification of all patents in force must be accessible to the public. The Congress will continue the debate upon the sixth resolution, where-by it is made obligatory on the holders of patents to place their inventions at the disposal of everybody wishing to use them upon payment of a fitting remu-neration.
