Engineer Cecil Goddard then took the stand again. He made the surprising statement that he roughly estimated 50 per cent of the line between Edmonton and McMurray was muskeg, and would have to be cordoroyed. In other words, the distance to McMurray on a straight line being 283 miles, there would be 144 miles of muskeg. He explained that this cordoroying is expensive, and adds considerably to the total cost of construction. Mr. Johnstone showed that in the joint estimate of the witness and Manager E. A. 
