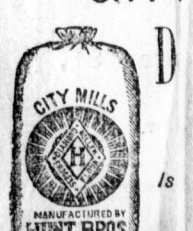

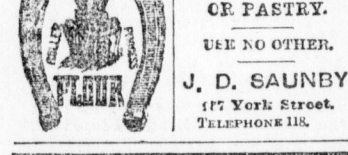

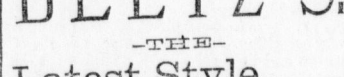
FAIR AND COOL.

September 2.

21 B. C.—The naval battle of Actium decided
the fate of the Roman world; Antony and
Cleopatra were defeated by Octavius.

1695—The great fire in London began in the
shop of a baker named Farryner, near the
Tower; it continued five days, destroying
13,400 houses, besides churches, etc., or five-
sixths of the city.

1685—Alice Lisle was executed for giving food
and lodging to a fugitive rebel of Mon-
mouth's army.

1723—John Howard, philanthropist and prison
reformer, was born at Hackney; died in
Russia 1790.

1788—Lady Mary Hervey, famous for beauty,
wit and goodness in the court of George III,
died.

1792—The Princess de Lamballe was murdered
in the street in Paris by a mob.

1813—Battle of Dresden, a mortal wounding
of General J. J. M. de Morsay.

1822—Lizzie Borden, charged with the murder
of her parents, was committed to jail in
Taunton, Mass. Tilton Hall, reputed mur-
derer of 60 men, was hanged at Wise Court
House, Va.

—The maneuvers of the British soldiers
at London Wednesday was a drawing card

—Sin Collins, the well known baseball

MADE MAD BY LOSSES.
An Indiana Farmer Shoots Three Per-
sons.—Man Killed and a
Woman Wounded.

WATERLOO, Ind., Sept. 1.—Samuel
Deeters, a bachelor living just east of
the town, who lost considerable money in
the Davis Bank failure at Auburn, went
crazily mad last night and used his
gun with fearful effects. He went to his
mother's house here to borrow money. On
being refused he shot her, producing a
severe wound. He then set fire to her
barn, and shot his way out of its contents.
Amos Bachtel and a married daughter,
Mrs. Lowe, neighbors, went to the rescue,
and Deeters shot several times at them.
Bachtel was shot through the abdomen and
died three hours later. Mrs. Lowe was
severely and perhaps fatally wounded.
Deeters was arrested and taken to Butler.

Drowned While Canoeing.
QUEBEC, Sept. 1.—News has reached
Quebec from Point-Au-Pic to the effect
that Young Dr. Stearns, son of Hon.
Alderman Stearns, of Montreal, was
drowned in the river at that place yester-
day. Mr. Stearns was paddling a canoe
in the river, whose current had become
very strong from recent rains. The canoe
upset, and all efforts to save him were use-
less. His body has not yet been found.
