Brilliant Victories

Welcome News Received From the Front.

Recent British Sorties at Ladysmith Were Decidedly Successful.

Gen. White's Dispatches Described as "Unduly Modest."

Caught the Boers in the Rear and Inflicted Heavy Loss.

One Section of the Enemy's Forces Perished Almost to a Man.

Boer Efforts to Capture Mafeking Repulsed by the Garrison.

London, Nov. 8.—The following is the text of a dispatch from Gen. Buller from Cape Town, dated Nov. 7, 12.55 p.m.:

"The following dispatch has been re-

ceived from the general commanding at Estcourt, dated Nov. 6:

"Since Friday there has been a cessation of hostilities. A note was sent that day to Gen. Joubert by Gen. White, at the request of the mayor, asking permission for non-combatants, sick and wounded, to go south. Gen. Joubert refused the request, but agreed to allow them to go to a special camp, four miles from Ladysmith. The townspeople refused to accept this offer. The sick and wounded and a few of the inhabitants were moved yesterday.

"A few shots were exchanged yesterday at the outposts.

"Friday's bombardment was heavy. Shells fell in the hospital, and one burst in a hotel during luncheon. No one was injured.

ONE CASUALTY IN THE TOWN.
"The only casualty in the town from the shells thus far is a Kaffir killed.

"There was a smart action on Friday towards Dewdrop. The troops, under Gen. Brookfield, drove the Boers back a considerable distance and disabled a gun.

"There was also fighting near Bulwana.

"Our loss altogether is eight killed and about twenty wounded. Ninety-eight Dundee wounded have arrived. They were sent here Saturday; all are doing well.

LADYSMITH ENTIRELY SAFE.
"The position here is now believed to be entirely safe. It has been greatly strengthened during the last 24 hours. The people have deserted their dwellings and are living in bomb-proof places, safe from shell fire. There is plenty of good stores of all kinds.

"Capt. Knapp and Lieut. Brabant were killed in Friday's action.

"The foregoing is an exact copy of a press censor telegram brought here by a Kaffir runner. There is no other official news.

BRILLIANT SORTIES.
Last night's welcome dispatches from the front have rent the veil of gloom enveloping Ladysmith, showing the British garrison not merely standing on the dogged defensive, but executing a series of brilliant sorties. Accounts from different sources agree that the laconic official description of Thursday's battle, as an "effective shelling of the Boer laager," was unduly modest. It appears that Gen. Sir George Stewart White, while sending a strong force of cavalry and infantry to attack

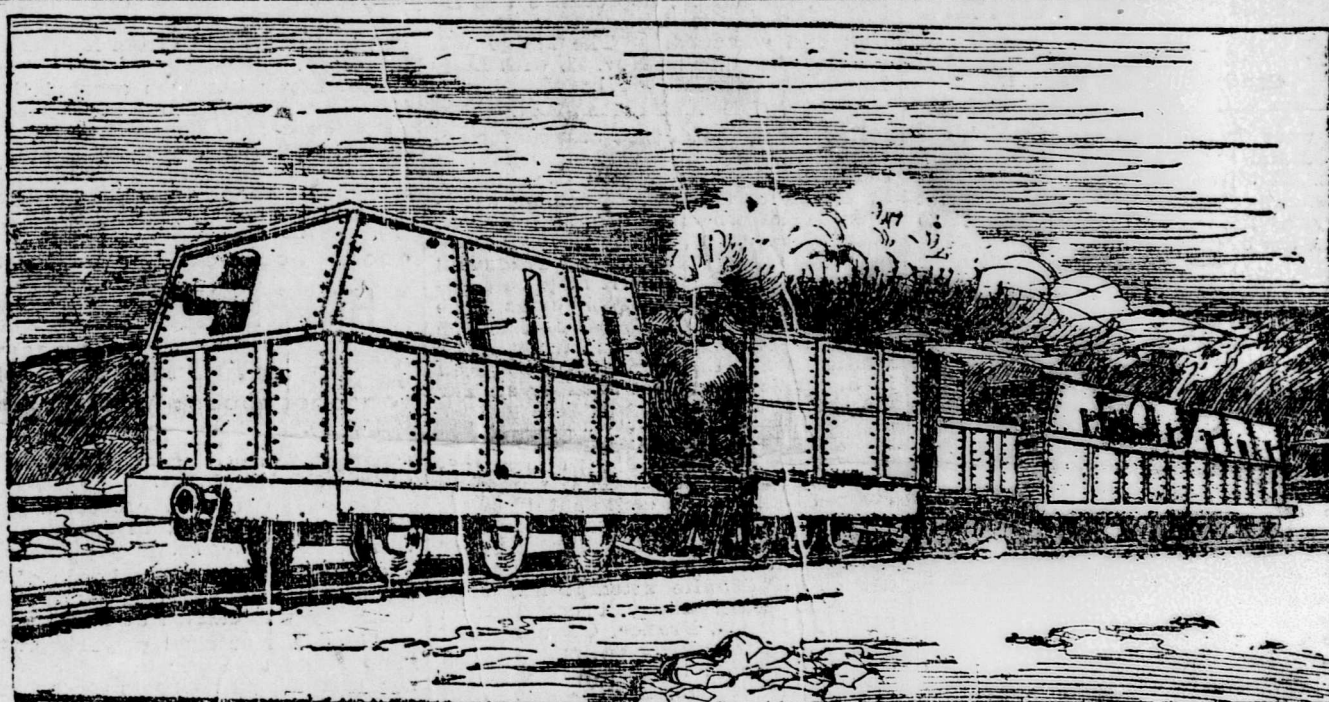
graph publishes the following dispatch from Pietermaritzburg, dated Saturday evening: Since the occupation of Colenso, the Boers have attempted no advance further south. Estcourt is now becoming a strong and growing camp. Major Wolfe Murray is in temporary command.

It is now possible to furnish official details of Friday's fighting around Ladysmith. The Boer artillery fire was accurate and well sustained, but ineffective. The British cavalry was constantly on the alert to prevent the Boer investment being too close. The cavalry and artillery, under Col. Brook, about noon, drove the enemy from all their positions with great slaughter. This attack was directed against a reported move of the enemy toward Pietermaritzburg. Our artillery shelled three of the enemy's guns into silence. The British loss was slight.

BOER TRICKERY.

Estcourt, Nov. 8.—The Boers proposed, under a flag of truce, on Thursday to send in a Boer spy, disguised as an ambulance driver for the wounded, to observe the British artillery fire.

A native eye-witness of Thursday's battle near Ladysmith says the Boers were caught on the open ground, and raised several white flags. The British then advanced, without firing, to accept the surrender of the Boers, but were received with a volley at close range. Enraged at this treachery, the Lancers, Hussars and Dragoons, followed by the infantry with fixed bayonets, charged through and through

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the river in front of them, they were charged by the cavalry, and seem to have

PERISHED ALMOST TO A MAN.
The British then returned to Ladysmith, without coming into touch with the Colenso garrison, which had retired to Estcourt. Sunday's dispatch from Estcourt, however, showed that an armored train had been sent back to Colenso to repair the line, and the next news may possibly be the restoration of communication with Ladysmith.

While the British forces are thus seeking to wipe out the battle of Nicholson's gap, the situation inside Ladysmith, according to the report of the war office, was quite satisfactory, and it is considered Gen. White may yet completely retrieve his reputation and that his force may emerge triumphant through the ordeal it is now undergoing.

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
