Brilliant Victories

Welcome News Received From the Front.

Ladysmith Were Decidedly Successful.

Gen. White's Dispatches Described as "Unduly Modest."

Caught the Boers in the Rear and Inflicted Heavy Loss.

One Section of the Enemy's Forces Perished Almost to a Man.

Boer Efforts to Capture Mafeking Repulsed by the Garrison.

London, Nov. 8 .- The following is the text of a dispatch from Gen. Buller from Cape Town, dated Nov. 7,

Recent British Sorties at the enemy at Tatham's, about ten miles west, near Bester's, apparently gave a surprise, the Boars evidently being CAUGHT ON THE OPEN VELDT, and their camp captured. Encouraged by this, Gen. White ordered a more general movement on the following day, which was again justified by success. Ladsymith had been isolated, and a Boer force had intercepted the railway between Ladysmith and Col-enso. This force on Friday had deenso. This force on Friday had descended upon Colenso, and, as shown by the dispatches from Estcourt, had compelled the hurried abandonment of Colenso, and a retirement of the British to Estcourt

ish to Estcourt. Gen. White had ascertained that the Boers were attacking Colenso, but he was not aware of the British retirement. He had determined, therefore, to attack the Boers in the rear, thus hoping to achieve the double object of drawing off attack upon the garrison of Colenso and possibly of reopening communication southward. The Boers had advanced southward until they had advanced southward until they had occupied the hills north of Tugela River and dominating Colenso on the other side of the stream. The hills slope to a plain that reaches to the banks of the Tugela. Gen. White's

division caught the Boers in the rear, and after the hills had been shelled, the British infantry stormed the position. Meanwhile the British cavalry swept around the hills, and as the retreating enemy descended into the plains, with British bayonets behind them and



It is now possible to furnish official details of Friday's fighting around Ladysmith. The Boer artillery fire was accurate and well sustained, but ineffective. The British cavalry was constantly on the alert to prevent the Boer investment being too close. The cavalry and artillery under Col. Brocklehurst, about noon, drove the enemy lehurst, about noon, drove the enemy from all their positions with great slaughter. This attack was directed against a reported move of the enemy toward Maritzburg. Our artillery shelled three of the enemy's guns into silence. The British loss was slight.

BOER TRICKERY. Estcourt, Nov. 8.-The Boers proposed, under a flag of truce, on Thursday to send in a Boer spy, disguised as an ambulance driver for the wounded, to observe the British artillery fire. A native eye-witness of Thursday's battle near Ladysmith says the Boers were caught on the open ground, and raised several white flags. The Brit-ish then advanced, without firing, to ish then advanced, without hing, to accept the surrender of the Boers, but were received with a volley at close range. Enraged at this treachery, the Lancers, Hussars and Dragoons, followed by the infantry with fixed bayonets, charged through and through

"'Since Friday there has been cessation of hostilities. A note was sent that day to Gen. Joubert by Gen. White, at the request of the mayor, asking permission for non-combatants, sick and wounded, to go south. Gen. Joubert refused the request, but agreed to allow them to go to a special camp, four miles from Ladysmith. The townspeople refused to accept this offer. The sick and wounded and a few of the inhabitants were moved yesterday.

"'A few shots were exchanged yesterday at the outposts.

"'Friday's bombardment was heavy Shells fell in the hospital, and one burst in a hotel during luncheon. No one was injured.

ONE CASUALTY IN THE TOWN. "The only casualty in the town from the shells thus far is a Kaffir

"There was a smart action on Friday towards Dewdrop. The troops, under Gen. Brocklehurst, drove the Boers back a considerable distance and disabled a gun.

"There was also fighting near Bulwana. "'Our loss altogether is eight killed and about twenty wounded. Ninetyeight Dundee wounded have arrived. They were sent here Saturday; all are doing well.

LADYSMITH ENTIRELY SAFE. "The positon here is now believed to be entirely safe. It has been greatly strengthened during the last 24 hours. The people have deserted their dwellings and are living in bomb-proof places, safe from shell fire. There is

"The foregoing is an exact copy of

BRILLIANT SORTIES. Last night's welcome dispatches from the front have rent the veil of gloom enveloping Ladysmith, showing the British garrison not merely standing on the dogged defensive, but executing a series of brilliant sorties. Accounts from different sources agree that the laconic official description of Thursday's battle, as an "effective shelling of the Boer laager," was unduly modest. It appears that Gen. Sir George Stewart White, while sending a strong force of cavalry and infantry to attack

REPORT CONFIRMED.

Estcourt, Natal, Sunday, Nov. 5-10:40 p.m.—A reliable native has brought confirmatory evidence of Friday's fighting south of Ladysmith. A reconnoissance in force was made by a British division, the object being to relieve the Colenso column, which had been attacked by the Boers. The British infantry charged the Boers, who were strongly posted on Globerskloof Hill, and drove them down on the plain towards the Tugela River, when the British cavalry, executing a fine flank movement, charged the Boers, almost annihilating them. The plain was strewn with slain Boers. COLENSO.

An armored train went over the Tugela bridge, and found Colenso intact, and also found the road and railway bridges strong. An Orange Free State force was sighted six miles from Colenso, on the Ladysmith side. It was supposed to have been engaged with the British forces from Ladysmith, Thursday. The Boers suffered heavily.

It is rumored that the Natal Dutch took part in the engagement, siding with the invading Boers. The enemy bombarded Colenso on Thursday until sunset, at the extreme range of nine centimeter Krupp guns. It is a fact that Gen. Joubert drew in his line, and that the Boers now have only outposts at Colensa have only outposts at Colenso.

BOERS MOURNING. Runners are bringing the names of the Boers who were killed and wounded outside Ladysmith, and their re-ports have caused much mourning among the relatives. A general Boer advance is not thought probable. Means have been taken to secure Pietermaritzburg against any popular attack, and also to relieve Ladysmith before the enemy can come further.

AT MATEKING.

Cape Town, Nov. 7. - A dispatch from Kuruman, dated Friday, Nov. 3, says a dispatch ruler arrived there from Mafeking that morning announcing that Colonel Baden-Powell had captured a number of mules and horses. Fighting was occurring daily at Mafeking, all, it was added, in favor of the garrison. Natives report that Colonel Plumer's force, from Tuli, is working its way from Rho-

desia, to relieve Mafelting. London, Wednesday, Nov. 8.—News has just arrived from Mafeking showing that up to Oct. 25 the Boers continued the bombardment, firing as many as 300 shells in 36 hours, though causing but little damage and wounding only four men. That day they closed in all round the town and made a determined attempt to rush it. The garrison turned out to a man and de-livered a terible rifle and Maxim fire, which speedily stampeded the Boers,
