HAMILTON'S DEMONSTRATION

The Ambitious City Stirred From Center to Circumference.

Grand Outburst of Enthusiasm for the Premier of Canada.

Hamilton, Nov. 5 .- Sir Wilfrid Laurier's triumphal tour culminated tonight in a monster demonstration in the city of Hamilton. There have been many demonstrations of a political character in the Ambitious City, but tonight's far outshone anything recorded in the annals of either of the two parties. The whole city was mad with excitement, the whole population seemed to be on the streets, and the outburst of enthusiasm was such as to carry all before it. It was 8:20 when the premier reached Hamilton after his arduous day of traveling and speaking. At that time the scene in the vicinity of the station almost beggared description. Hundreds of torches flared, and innumerable tin horns were blown, making a din that was deafening. A long line of carriages extended down Stuart street, and an imposing array of mounted men were drawn up. The din was great while the crowd were waiting for the premier, but it became a veritable bediam when he emerged from the G. T. R. station. A hurricane of cheers broke forth, which

was carried on by the masses of spectators farther up, until it echoed far into the very heart of the city. Sir Wilfrid and Mr. Mulock having taken their seats in a carriage provided for them, the huge parade through the city began. It was a wonderful spectacle. The blaizing torches, the fireworks shooting far into the sky, the glow of vari-colored lights, the crash of brass bands, and the shouting and the cheering crowds made an ensemble that was unique and inspiring. The local committee were wise in arranging for two halls, but they could have filled half a dozen without any diffiof the returned soldiers 160 acres of culty.
