ARE HELPING YOUNG WOMEN

The Praiseworthy Year's Performance of the "Y"

Annual Meeting Reveals Extent of the Good Work Being Done by the Institution.

A body of energetic women, working for the betterment of their fellows, with no money consideration at the end, is the Young Women's Christian Association. Their annual meeting was held last night, at their rooms, and the reports read were of a highly gratifying nature, and showed with what success and enjoyment a burden can be taken up. The work carried on is unique in its way, and should meet with encouragement from citizens generally. The only drawback in the association has taken the shape in lack of room. Owing to increased membership in every department, the work cannot be carried on as it should be. In a larger building board could be obtained for every member desiring, there could be a well-equipped gymnasium, and the well-earned noon-hour could be spent partly in recreation. In Peterboro, Brantford and nearly all the large cities of the Dominion, the association has a new and fully-equipped building, and there is no reason, except financial one, why a similar one should not be erected here.

Rev. Dr. Robert Johnston presided at the meeting, and spoke of the admirable way in which the work was being carried on.

Owing to the resignation of Miss Kirkpatrick in April, the general secretary's report was read by Miss Little, traveling college worker. The report spoke of the general rise of the association since its origin in England in 1855, and the remarkable fact that branches were now established in nearly every city in the world. In the fourth biennial conference, held at the beginning of the year, Miss Carson, of this city, was elected, and has since been appointed field worker in Canada, and has rendered much assistance during the year.

A very successful series of meetings was held in February. Religious meetings were held every Sunday and Tuesday afternoon and evening. The total number of meetings was 76, with an aggregate attendance of 1,203.

Educational meetings were held throughout the season, and arithmetic, reading, spelling, writing and composition were taught. The Shakespeare club met once a week during the year, and discussed the "Merchant of Venice."

The Current Topic Club discussed the life and times of Queen Victoria, the progress of women during the century. Humphrey Ward's "Eleanor," and "The Passion Play."

Very interesting and helpful lectures were given by the Rev. Mr. Prof. Clark and Messrs. Deans and Saunders.

Receptions were held every month for the benefit of the club and their friends, and pleasant evenings were always spent.

Seventy-five young ladies were accommodated during the summer at the Port Stanley home of the association, "Summerholm." The board thanked the residents of Fraser Heights for their reception of the concert held there. The proceeds from the home amounted to \$46, which will be given towards beautifying the place. The success of the year was largely due to the efforts of Miss Priddis, the president, seconded by her energetic associates.

The statistical report showed an aggregate of 5,832 visitors, members and applicants.

The report of the treasurer showed a balance of \$139.98 on the right side. The officers for the coming year are: President, Miss Minnie Trebilcock; vice-president, Miss McMillan, Mrs. Weld, Mrs. J. W. Jones, Miss A. Yeates, and Mrs. C. E. Leonard; treasurer, Miss McGuffin; recording secretary, Miss Gunn; corresponding secretary, Miss Jarvis; general secretary, Miss A. C. Stover.

At the close of the meeting, Mr. M. D. Fraser made a few complimentary remarks on the businesslike nature of the reports and their interesting character. Mr. Fraser said he did not see how such information laid before the citizens could fail to help the institution.

GOOD WOMAN PASSED AWAY.
Mrs. John Young Died at St. Joseph's Hospital Yesterday.

At St. Joseph's Hospital, London, on Tuesday, Nov. 5, Mary, wife of John Young, passed away after a brief illness. Mrs. Young was the daughter of the late Robert McGee, of Manchester, in Huron county, and had resided in London for the past fifteen years. She was a woman of devout Christian character, greatly beloved by her husband, and the daughters, Miss Mamie Young and Mrs. Percy Hill, of Wingham. Mrs. Young had been for years a faithful member of the First Presbyterian Church in this city, and was greatly interested in the Ladies' Aid and Women's Foreign Missionary Society in that congregation. She leaves two sisters, Mrs. D. R. Menzies, of Staples, and Mrs. McLaughlin, of Auburn, and one brother, Robert, of Woodstock.
