force shot a man to death. Early in the eighties, Tom Lee, a notorious character, was killed at a small place called Harmony, north of Stratford, by the late James Crawford (a brother of Sergt. Robert Crawford, now a member of the force), who, at that time, was a sergeant. Lee, in company with a pal named Jim Wright, had been hanging around London for some time. They were living with a woman named Annie Devoy, a character who was well known to the police, and when the men had a disagreement with the woman and left the city she informed the polic that they were the parties who committed a series of robberies at toll-gates throughout the country, and which had baffled the police. Lee was a shoemaker by trade, and it was learned after a time that he was working at Harmony. The late Sergt. Crawford

was sent to the place to arrest Lee, and also Wright, if the latter could be found, and to assist him the late Detective Harry Phair and Detective Heenan were sent along. Lee and Wright were found in a small shop in the village, and the moment Crawford and the detectives entered the place Lee whipped out a revolver, and was about to point it at Crawford, when the latter drew his own and fired. The bulle struck Lee squarely between the eye and he fell to the floor a corpse. Wright was sentenced to ten years for the burglaries, escaped from the penitentiary shortly after he was taken there, but was retaken.

CRIMES RECALLED.

Two Instances Where Officers' Lives Were Taken by Crooks.

The killing of "Shorty" ("Billy") recalls two cases in this city in which the police suffered severely at the hands of crooks. On Oct. 13, 1892, Detective Harry Phair was walking south on Richmond street, opposite St. Paul's Cathedral, making his way to the police station, when a citizen, who was driving, pointed northward, and shouted, "There's a job for you up there." Phair looked around and saw a couple of men acting in a disorderly manner. He over-took them at Maple street, and at-tempted to arrest one. The man struggled, but Phair threw him on the ground. Then the tough shouted for help and cried to his mate, "You have your gun; use it." The mate did so, sending a bullet through Phair's lungs. The patrol wagon was called, and the
