IS UNSANITARY.

Basement of Market House in Bad Condition.

Ald. Campbell Says That Money for Repairs Should Have Been Appropriated.

Ald. Campbell was very emphatic at the last council meeting in the expression of his opinion that sufficient money should be appropriated to put the market building in a more sanitary condition. "The situation is plain enough," he said, today, when speaking of the council's action. "The building has been declared by the medical health officer to be in such an unsanitary state that the board of health would be justified in closing it up. The matter came up last year, but it was after the estimates had been passed, and there was no money. This year, there was no such excuse; and the \$500 or \$600 required should have been appropriated without question. The facts as stated by the medical health officer are, that the basement of the building is not only unclean, but it cannot be cleaned in its present shape. There is a brick floor which was laid when the building was constructed half a century ago. The floor is uneven. The bricks are rough and broken, with as many cracks and crevices as there are bricks; and for ages decaying animal and vegetable matter has been thrown and dropped on the floor. Even though frequently swept, particles of this foul material lodges in the crevices. Then when the floor is washed, the water dissolves portions of the refuse and carries it between and under the bricks, which are soaking in a bed of filth. This in a building where butter and meat are constantly exposed for sale. The conditions are liable to produce disease, and no one can say how much disease throughout the city may

have come from this source. There is no possible remedy except to take up the bricks, clean out the dirt, and lay down a cement floor, with proper facilities for flushing and draining.
