Shields, asked the members to remain, and deal with a resolution regarding he question of separate schools in the Northwest. The resolution was briefly discussed and carried by a standing ote, only three or four keeping their The resolution, which will be seats. sent to Ottawa, is as follows:
"Whereas the educational clause of the

Government Northwest autonomy bill would make the perpetual support of separate schools in the new provinces a constitutional obligation, we, the nembers of the Adelaide Street Baptist Church London, desire in the most emphatic way possible to protest against such legislation. We do so

"1. We believe such legislation would be an unjustifiable interference with the provinces' right to determine and control their own system of education.

"2. We believe in the absolute separation of church and state, and therefore contend that no government has any right to devote public moneys to the support of sectarian religious institutions of any sort. "3. Believing in the principle of re-presentative government, we are strongly of the opinion that upon a question affecting the constitution of wo provinces of this Dominion having an approximate area of 500,000 square miles, and capable of supporting many millions of people, the consent of the country in general, and of the Northwest Territories in particular should be obtained before such legislation as is proposed, is irrevocably passed." Despite the storm in the evening there was a good attendance, when the pastor dealt with the education clause of the Northwest autonomy bill. Mr. Shieids spoke from the words "Take
