He could not state whether or not the figures were accurate, but he did say that Engineer Sothman had informed him that the London Electric Company's plant would be of no use to the city. "He told me that there was no need whatever for an auxiliary plant," said his worship. "The system will be so complete that there will be no danger of a breakdown or anything of that
