HARRISTON LOOKING FOR NEW FACTORIES

The Board of Trade Is Putting
Forth Every Effort To
Make Town Grow.

HAS SPLENDID UTILITIES

Railway Facilities Are First-Class and
There Is a Big Territory, North
as a Market.

Harriston, Feb. 15.—"Watch us grow," is Harriston's slogan for 1912. Businessmen and board of trade, it appears, have taken a new leaf of life, and are resolved to put the town on the map, nail it there, and clinch the nails.

Harriston has always led in municipal improvements. It was the first town in Northern Ontario to install electric lights and granolithic sidewalks. Now it has placed in commission a new municipal waterworks system at a cost of \$25,000.

Needs More Industries.

But in industrial development, Harriston, up to the present, has not been so fortunate. Possessed of railroad facilities superior to most of its sister municipalities, the progressive businessmen feel that it ought to get its share of Ontario's industrial development.

In past years attempts to establish factories have ended somewhat disastrously. A shoe company to which the town had loaned some \$10,000, failed. The town, however, leveled on the building of the defunct concern, and soon afterward another factory was started. That, too, went up in smoke, but the board of trade, undeterred by previous head lurch, succeeded in getting a factory in its place. This institution is a pronounced success, and promises to become one of the mainstays of the village.

Big Plant Saved.

Hardly had this new concern become well established than consternation was created by the decision of the Davies Packing Company to close down their Harriston plant, which was established in 1900, and move the business to Toronto.

The businessmen tackled this matter also, and after a conference with the Davies people, it was decided that the old packing plant would be operated as a cold storage warehouse for distribution purposes. With the growth of the northern towns this promises to mean more to Harriston than the packing plant.

The cold storage concern already established is completing additions which will almost double its capacity.

Harriston now has, among other industries, a stove foundry, a casket maker, and a furniture factory, all of which are in highly satisfactory condition.

A new postoffice, one of the handiest in the country, is being built to take care of the mail service, and the board of trade is looking for new industries. They want all they can get of small shops and factories, such as abound in Berlin, and other small industrial cities. Moreover, it is proposed to get them.

As one man says: "We have the railroads, and they simply can't pass us up. Direct connection by two lines with Toronto and Hamilton, as well as the big country to the north, gives us plenty of leverage, and it is only a question of hustle."

WAS NOT RABIES

Dog's Head Sent From Brucefield Reported on Favorably at Toronto.

Miss Annie Armstrong visited recently at her home on the Goshen line. A great many people around here have had vegetables frozen in their cellars during the winter.

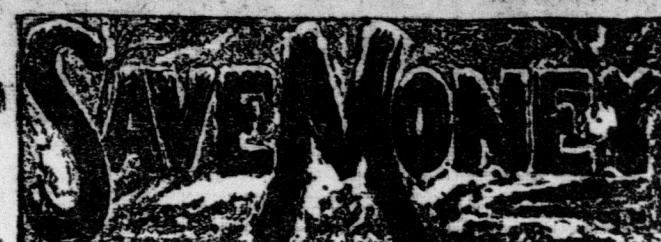
