Sarnia, Sept. 7.—Ernest Nettleton was sentenced to three months in prison by Magistrate Gorman yesterday for supplying liquor to John and Patrick Pettitt, who are on the prohibited list.

The two Pettitts are the men who were given 30 days in jail for being intoxicated.

Another young man, named Slinger, made the complaint against the prisoner.

Slinger alleges that Bond, with whom he roomed, stole some of his clothes while he was out of town for two or three weeks. Bond, on the other hand, claims that he took the clothing, thinking that the owner would not return. He also says that the plaintiff never came around and asked him for the wearing apparel or said anything to him about it until after swearing out the warrant, when he hunted him up, and told him to get out of town, as the police were looking for him.

DEATH OF MRS. BROWN

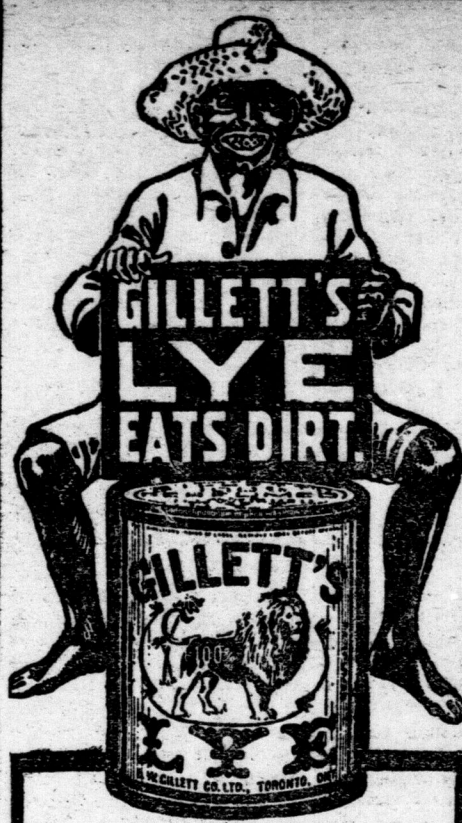
Was Formerly a Nurse in Sarnia General Hospital.

BEQUEATHES HOMES

Eighteen Families Made Owners of Houses They Occupied.

Philadelphia, Pa., Sept. 7.—Eighteen families were made owners of the homes in which they lived under the will of William Hawkins, of Philadelphia, who died in 1910. The will was filed today. Hawkins was 97 years old at the time of his death.

The houses bequeathed by Mr. Hawkins had been rented from him by the beneficiaries for years. About a year before he died Hawkins executed the deed of trust to the Commonwealth Title Insurance and Trust Company, and to Michael Collins, a real estate operator, providing that eighteen of his oldest tenants should, after his death, be given clear title to their homes. The houses are worth between \$2,000 and \$3,000 each. Mr. Hawkins died leaving an estate worth about \$200,000.

The facts regarding the will, which is one of the most unusual filed here in years, did not become generally known until the deed of trust was filed in connection with the settlement of the estate. Some members of the Hawkins family are contesting a portion of the will, and have brought suit here. No relatives are named in the will.

AUSTRALIA'S NAVAL SCHOOL

Complete College Equipment To Be Erected at Jervis Bay.

Sydney, N. S. W., Sept. 7.—The new Australian naval college will be erected at Jervis Bay, a convenient inlet, not far south of Sydney. The exact site will be Captain's Point, on the South Sydney.

Besides the classrooms, laboratories and all the other college equipment, there will be barracks and recreation rooms, staff quarters, and extensive power and refrigerator plant. The building groups will cover four acres of ground. The scheme in full working order will see 150 of Australia's budding naval officers studying at the college. Midshipman-cadets, on passing the required examination, are to be entered at the age of 13; all expenses will be paid by the Government, which will even provide pocket money. The college term is four years. Then will follow six months on an instructional cruiser, then two years' training at sea, and at the end of that time, after passing the necessary examination, the young officer will begin his career as a sub-lieutenant.

The college should be finished and ready some time in 1914.

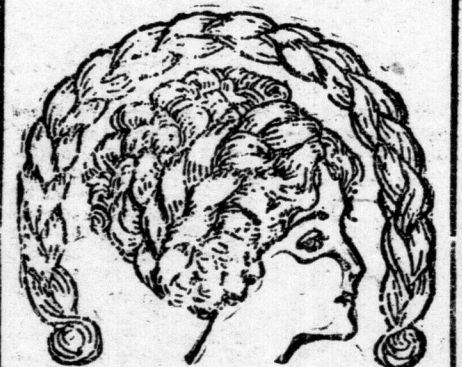

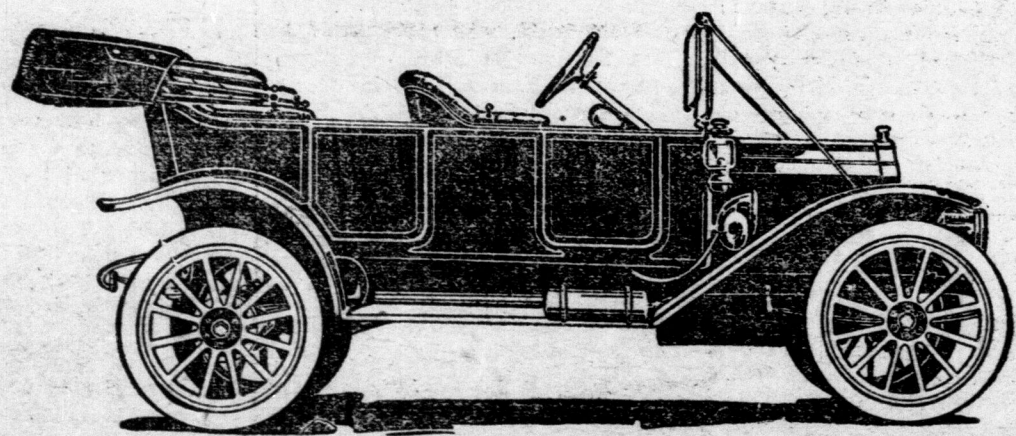

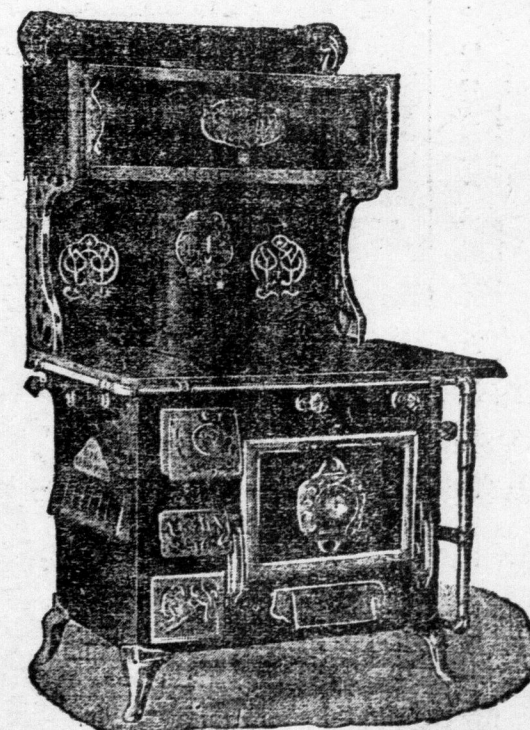
