A BUMPER WHEAT CROP.
Thousands of Men Required—This Year's Harvest Promises To Be the Largest in the History of Canada.

According to present indications the wheat crop of 1913 will be the greatest ever harvested in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta, thus requiring the farm laborers of the east to assist in harvesting the world's greatest bread basket.

The Governments of the respective provinces state that many thousands men will be required for this year's harvest. These will have to be principally recruited from Ontario, and the prosperity of Canada depends on securing labor promptly. The Canadian Pacific, on which company will fall practically the entire task of transporting the men to the West, is already making special arrangements for this year. Excursions from points in Ontario to Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta will be run and special trains operated, making the trip in about thirty-six hours and avoiding any change of cars or transfers. **More Dredging on
The Panama Canal**

Panama, Aug. 27.—The first large vessel to navigate the Gatun Lake section of the Panama Canal, 24 miles in length, a suction dredge, known as No. 82, left its moorings near the Gatun locks yesterday, and sailed under its own steam to a point north of Gamboa Dike.

The dredge will begin the removal of 150,000 cubic yards of silt lodged by currents. The dredge has been tied up in Gatun for several months waiting for the lake to rise to a sufficient height to enable it to make the trip.

INFANT MORTALITY

Edmonton, Alta., Aug. 28.—That intermarriage, continued through generations with the lack of nourishment of mothers at the time of child birth, and the indolence use of the vilest tobacco, by women are the three principal causes contributing to the enormous rate of infant mortality among the Indians of the north, is the view taken by Gerald C. Card, Indian agent at Fort Simpson, on the Great Slave River, who has just come out from his post, having spent about seven weeks travelling by snows and rover steamers. Fort Simpson, by the route travelled, is about 1,200 miles north of Edmonton.

**HOSPITAL NOT LIKELY
TO BUY CITY AMBULANCE**
Upkeep of the Apparatus Would Be Too Expensive Says Member of Board.

When the tenders for the purchase of the city ambulance from the police commission are opened, it is likely that one from the hospital trust will be received. Numerous suggestions to the effect that the city should buy the ambulance and install it at Victoria Hospital to be used for sick. The have been made, but several of the members of the hospital trust do not look with favor upon the suggestions.

They contend that if they were to purchase the ambulance and keep it at Victoria Hospital it would cost the city in the neighborhood of \$1,500 a year to maintain it. Two men, one day and the other for night duty, would have to be hired, while a staff would have to be built on the hospital grounds to house the ambulance and the horses.

It is estimated that the ambulance is called out between 500 and 600 times a year to convey sick patients who cannot afford to pay for transportation to the hospital, and the suggestion made by members of the trust is that the city enter into a contract with the two firms which own private ambulances to carry such patients to the hospital at \$1 a call.

Too Costly.

"I think that is the proper solution of the problem," said a member of the trust in conversation with the hospital. "We are now crowded for room on the hospital premises, and I do not see where we are able to house the ambulance and horses. We would have to employ two men, who would have to be paid a good salary, because we would have to have first-class men to handle that job. Then we would have to purchase horses and feed, which would easily run the cost of maintenance up to \$1,500 a year. There are two private ambulances in the city, and I think arrangements could be made with the private ambulance firms to have the hospital at \$1 a call. The new police ambulance will look after all emergency cases and patients who can pay for conveyance to the hospital can arrange with the private ambulance firms. When the question comes up at the next meeting of the hospital trust, I am going to make a motion along those lines, and I feel sure that the trust will support it."

Then the ladder was lowered with the same speed and precision as before. There was much favorable comment by the bystanders at the splendid co-operation of the men.

**SPARK FROM LOCOMOTIVE
DESTROYS A COTTAGE**

**Firemen Have Midnight Run
To East End Blaze, and
No Hydrant.**

Fire, supposed to have been started by a spark from a Grand Trunk locomotive, totally destroyed a frame cottage, owned and occupied by Mr. George Rump, Winton avenue, shortly before midnight Wednesday. Neighbors, aroused by the flames, organized a volunteer fire brigade before the firemen arrived, and succeeded in saving the greater part of the furniture. It is estimated that the damage will amount to about \$1,000.

Mr. Rump and his wife were visiting in West London at the time, and while returning to their home noticed from a distance that it was in flames. That was the first intimation they had of the destruction of their house. P. C. Holden, who was on duty in that vicinity, was the first to notice the fire. Flames were then shooting from the roof of the kitchen. He pulled the alarm, but when the firemen reached the scene, which is about three miles from the centre of the city, they found that there were no hydrants in that section. As a result they had to stand around after using the contents of the chemical tanks and watch the house burn to the ground. While going to the fire the automobile truck got stuck in a hole in the road on Winton avenue several blocks from the fire. Before it could be extricated the men had to dig it out. The other apparatus experienced considerable difficulty in reaching the place, as the roads in that section are in bad condition and full of pitch-holes.
