No Hydrant. TO BUY CITY AMBULANCE

Upkeep of the Apparatus Would Be Too Expensive Says Member of Board.

When the tenders for the purchase of the city ambulance from the police com-missioners are opened it is not likely hat one from the hospital trust will be eceived. Numerous suggestions to the ffect that the city should buy the amulance and install it at Victoria Hospital to be used for sick calls, have been nade, but several of the members of the ospital trust do not look with favor pen the suggestions.

They contend that if they were to purhase the ambulance and keep it at Vicoria Hospital it would cost the city in he neighborhood of \$1,500 a year to Two men, one day and the maintain it. other for night duty, would have to b nired, while a stable would have to be built on the hospital grounds to house

he ambulance and the horses. It is estimated that the ambulance alled out between 500 and 600 times year to convey sick patients who cannot afford to pay for transportation to the hospital, and the suggestion made by members of the trust is that the city enter into a contract wih the two firms which own private ambulances to carry

such patients to the hospital at \$1 a call. Too Costly. "I think that is the proper solution of the problem," said a member of the trust in conversation with the hospital. "We are now crowded for room on the hospital premises, and I do not see where we would be able to house the ambulance and horses. We would have to employ two men, who would have to be paid a good salary, because we would have to have first-class men to handle that job. Then we would have to purchase horses and feed, which would easily run the cost of maintenance up to \$1,500 a year. There are two private ambulances in the city, and I think arrangements could be made with them to carry the poor patients to the hospital at \$1 a call. The new police ambulance will look after all emergency cases and patients who can pay for onveyance to the hospital can arrange ofth the private ambulances. When the estion comes up at the next meeting of he hospital trust, I am going to make a

motion along those lines, and I feel sure that the trust will support it." Hospital Trust
