In times of peace the irtelligence department of any army was a most important one; its work consisting of mapping out various sections of the country, with its physical features, and natual resources and collecting information of every kind which might prove useful in time of war. When the army was on active service the intelligence department was even more essential. It then became a duty of the intelligence officers by every means possible to supofficers by every means possible to sup-ply the army with information, not only about the enemy's country, but also his strength and position. In modern war-fare much of this work is accomplished by aeroplanes and dirgibles, as well as by the older methods of cavairy recon-naisance. The work, he said, called for courage and resourcefuliness of the highest order.
